Chairmans Report

Kia ora tatou,

It has been heartening and rewarding to see the growth and progress being made by our clubs across the Northern Region in the 2012/13 season. We have continued to see the rate of increase in membership recruitment over recent years maintained. Advances have been made in the development and delivery of the essential programs that support our clubs and members and most importantly, the high quality of water safety and lifesaving services that we provide continues to improve and expand to meet the growing and diversifying population of our region.

Earlier this year, the clubs of SLSNR voted to confirm our on-going constitutional and governance independence, which we had been operating under since withdrawing from the structures and strictures of the SLSNZ initiated "Project Groundswell". This was an important action taken by the clubs of SLSNR to protect our ability to plan for an increasingly complex and demanding future. As observed in my report last year, the pattern that was emerging from SLSNZ of funding diminishment, cost transfer and the inconsistent application of resources to our region has largely continued to be the case.

The planning and activity to support a sustainable financial

future for SLSNR continues to be a critical challenge. Acknowledging this, SLSNR has recently undertaken much needed improvements to the structure and roles within our administration to pursue the level of innovation and capability required to support the funding needed for clubs to deliver essential lifesaving services and programs.

In working through the strategic and re-organisational implications of our planning for the future, I would like to personally acknowledge the positive and energetic nature of our membership. I would also like to acknowledge and thank our CEO Pam Elgar, the impressive work of our volunteer committees and the support of our SLSNR staff team-they have all contributed greatly to our progress this season.

I would also like to formally thank our sponsors and funders who have supported us over the past season and over the past years. As the population we serve in the Northern Region continues its significant rate of growth and associated diversity, the importance of your support also grows.

On behalf of the Board of Surf Life Saving Northern Region, I would like to express our gratitude for the dedication, participation and passion of all of our patrolling club members, whose skill and sense of duty defines us as a movement.

Surf Life Saving Northern Region

CEO's Report

The 12 months covered by this report have seen significant changes within Surf Life Saving Northern Region. Throughout, the organisation continued to provide a high quality service to the public through the delivery of its programmes and services in a cost effective manner to the satisfaction of our members, funders and many stakeholders.

Our organisation will always be judged on the effectiveness of our beach patrols and the surf lifesaving services we provide. We can be proud of the work undertaken over the 24 week season.

643 people owe their lives to our outstanding lifeguards and the invaluable service that they perform.

GOVERNANCE AND ORGANISATION

The Board continued its work to put in place plans to ensure SLSNR remains a strongly self-governing and self-administering and financially sustainable organisation.

The ethos of 'Volunteer Led - Professionally Managed' is clearly demonstrated in the governance structure of Board supported by four Operational and two Standing Committees who provide the vital element of ensuring that the views and expertise of our members and clubs are utilised in the delivery of our programmes. Thanks must go to all the volunteers who give many hours to support the on-going development of our SLSNR.

Our clubs' decision to confirm our constitutional and organisational independence from SLSNZ resulted in reviewing our strategic plan and organisational structure. Significant structural change was entered into after consultation with clubs. As with any change this was challenging for staff and members. I am confident the reorganisation will strengthen our ability to innovate and build capability plus provide the much needed funding to clubs to ensure we continue to provide essential emergency

services and lifesaving programmes to our communities.

CLUB SUSTAINABILITY AND LIFE SAVING

The strength of our clubs is at the core of all we do and the collective effort of the 17 clubs has resulted in some truly remarkable outcomes. Our ability to achieve the outcomes below was strengthened by the growth in our membership which was up by 34% or 460 members.

This season we served over 80,371 patrol hours delivered 643 rescues, 789 first aids, 136 searches and over 37,000 preventative actions directly helping in excess of 131,649 people. Ninety-nine% of the activity at our beaches is geared to prevention – stopping people getting into a situation that may demand a rescue.

Regardless of that, there are times when our lifeguards are asked to put themselves into dangerous situations in order to save others. The shark attack incident at Muriwai was one such instance where our guards responded willingly and competently along with Parks and Reserves staff and NZ Police. We must commend all of our lifeguard for what they do and encourage and assist them to continue to develop their skills to ensure they are equipped to handle any situation that may arise.

Demand for our lifesaving service continues to grow. We must ensure we are ready to face the challenge.

The paid mid-week lifeguard service covered 25 beaches and employed over 95 seasonal staff. The busiest beaches were patrolled for 15 weeks. The cost of this programme now exceeds \$500k annually.

SPORT

Our athletes continue to enjoy competing both as individuals and for clubs.

In early January Northern Region hosted Central Coast and NSW country teams for the bi-annual Trans Tasman Tri Series. Events were held at Waipu, Omaha and Orewa. Our team continued to improve throughout the series and provided our athletes with excellent development opportunities against their fierce Aussie cousins.

At the SLSNZ National Championships at Mt. Maunganui, Northern Region Clubs performed well with Red Beach placing 3rd, Mairangi Bay 5th and Piha 6th in the overall points.

The Northern Region Champs were again successfully held at Ruakaka.

This was the first time the Lifesaver Relay was run in New Zealand; this is a 9 person relay which includes a boat crew. Its inclusion provided a great finale to the Regional Champs.

Proudly, we had two athletes in the Development Squad and seven athletes in World Champs Squad.

Alongside our athletes in NZ squads we have Duane Dalton and Jason Pocock as SLSNZ selectors and Jason Pocock has been reappointed as Assistant Coach of the SLSNZ team.

We note proudly that several Northern Region athletes competed at the World Champs with the team bringing home a win.

At a regional level, our competitions were well attended with 266 entries in the Pool Champs, over 400 entries for Northern Region champs and 634 entries for Junior Surf Championship.

Sport is key to our recruitment and retention strategy. It provides a fabulous opportunity for our lifeguards to practise their skills in a competitive environment whilst keeping their physical fitness at peak standards. We are thankful for the great athletes we have and will work hard to ensure we continue to develop this part of our organisation.

It would be remiss not to mention the officials, coaches, administrators who give of their time to provide the framework for competitions to run efficiently. Thank you all.

JUNIOR SURF

Our Junior Surf programme is a real strength of the region and is a fantastic programme supported by a large number

of officials and helpers.

2012 saw significant growth by twelve clubs in their Junior Surf programmes. Increasing the numbers involved in Junior Surf from 1779 to 2150 in the past year. The Northern Region Junior Surf Champs was again held in Orewa with severely trying conditions. This provided a great platform for those Junior Surf athletes who went on to compete at Oceans 13.

FUNDING

No community organisation can function without the support of core corporate partners, sponsors, funders, donors and supporters. We are extremely grateful for all the support we have received over the 2012-13 year. Without this support the exceptional level of programmes and services delivered by Surf Lifesaving Northern Region would not be possible.

Special thanks must go to the Auckland Regional Amenities Funding Board who provided \$1,120,000 (some 40% of our overall regional funding). \$310,000 of this is distributed direct to clubs as operational grants. We received further funds toward life saving and club operating costs from another six Territorial Local Authorities (Hamilton City Council, Waikato Regional Council, Waikato District Council, Far North, Kaipara and Whangarei District Councils) and we thank them for their support also.

Our principal gaming funder, Trillian Trust has continued its support committing over \$276,000 in addition to grants made directly to clubs. This is a major contribution and one that SLSNR appreciates.

Thanks must also go to Lion Foundation, Pub Charity, Tennyson Trust, and Oxford Sports Trust who have supported us with significant grants this year.

Tip Top has been a strong supporter particularly with our Junior Surf programme and providing support at our annual

Awards of Excellence evening. Sadly we have ended our three year relationship due to changes in their operation.

Toyota Financial Services have been a fantastic supporter of our service by providing great vehicles for the SLSNR team. Yamaha NZ has also contributed greatly to our organisation through the provision of a six month lease ATV vehicle free of charge to the winner of our Club of the Year Award. This is a significant benefit to the club.

LEADERSHIP

This year saw the development of two significant new programmes within the Region. The Regional Leaders for Life programme was a project based programme developed by SLSNZ and implemented regionally. Our candidates developed two programmes – one focused on diversity and the other focused on inter agency communication and support. Both are being developed into activities that will bear fruit in 2013/14 season.

The Senior Leadership camp was developed in response to a need identified for the 20-40 year age group. This also proved very successful and will continue as a standard programme. Thanks must go to the dedicated volunteers who gave countless hours to develop these programmes.

SURF EDUCATION

We have experienced excellent growth in this area. We recognise we have a unique capability to provide three programmes in Surf to Schools, Beach Education and City Nippers. These programmes are ably delivered by our specialist instructors through collaborative arrangements with our clubs culminating in lessons on safety for over 13,000 school children.

We will continue to emphasize and grow this area as confident children and alert parents help ensure safe beach experiences.

FINANCIAL

The financial statements detailed in the Annual Report represent another solid performance from the organisation in a challenging financial environment. Income was up from 2011/12 year, attributable in the main part to the growth

in sponsorship and grant funding and very tight financial controls. A net surplus of \$129,232 has been achieved.

We were again able to provide our clubs outside the Auckland Regional Amenities Funding Agency arrangement with operational grants from our won income to ensure funding parity to all our clubs.

I would like to specifically thank Fiona Little for her attention to detail in managing the accounts of SLSNR over the past year and the on-going oversight and guidance provided by Board member Susanna Stuart.

GOING FORWARD

Economic conditions indicate that the donor/sponsor/grant environment will remain flat at best, however SLSNR will be continuing to implement strategic priorities and management plan to deliver on our key platforms of club sustainability, quality lifeguards, community education, sport and leadership programmes.

2013/14 year is going to be another challenging year financially. Demand for our services is increasing, and we are under pressure to grow our presence at new beaches and extend services and programmes at beaches we already patrol.

CONCLUSION

This year has been challenging as we have moved the organisation forward on an number of fronts. I am extremely grateful to all the Board members however a specific thank you to Stephen Smith who was always available to give me the context and background to events and helped provide wise counsel when it was required.

Specific mention must be made to the staff of SLSNR who delivered outstanding results in difficult circumstances. Thank you all. The staff changes that have occurred have meant we have lost some truly outstanding people and I wish to acknowledge their contribution.

I am proud to be part of Surf Life Saving Northern Region.

Lifesaving Report

The 2012/2013 season has been a good season in terms of lifesaving, but it has been the most challenging season in terms of structure, or, restructure as it turned out. Tom, Pam and the staff at the Northern Region office have been absolutely professional, tireless in their work and a pleasure to deal with despite serious upheavals. The loss of knowledge that accompanied the CDO disestablishment will be felt for a while and new lines of communication will need to be created with clubs so that we get the best representation of their views into the LOC and accurate decisions and directions can be chosen. I implore all clubs to make this a focus area and not leave it to the Northern office to initiate contact, but to get involved proactively on decisions that affect your clubs and the region.

Northern Region lifeguards have topped the country again. Volunteer hours were just over 80,371. Rescues (643) and preventatives (37,211) trended sharply up this year. People involved in preventatives is markedly up to 131,649. This is an alarming reversal from last season where we had the numbers trending down, but it does show quite clearly that, in the event of another great summer season, our lifeguards will be stretched even further. With another long, hot summer forecast, I'd like to ask clubs to start reviewing options for extending their patrol seasons where beach visitors warrant it.

The ASB Trust application has had a major boon with a 3 year deal agreed that gives us a good budget so that we can work with clubs to understand their medium term equipment plans and fund suitably. The Northern office will be in contact to discuss opportunities and areas where

careful planning and continued good maintenance habits will allow clubs to more accurately replace equipment and also to save and spend on big ticket items that the annual process may not have been able to fit in.

The National Lifesaving Committee, chaired by Allan Mundy, was busy this year. Reviews and initiatives started at a national level aligned well with work already underway in Northern and many of our major pieces of work have been fed directly into the national framework. These include developing process and plans upon a new patrol assessment, aligned radio communications, Coronial Reports, Surf Education/ Public Education Reviews, Critical Incident Support, First Aid training and development of lifeguard uniforms.

The coming season will present new challenges and we will need more from volunteers in order to achieve the programs and services that keep Northern leading the rest of New Zealand. As a region, we need to keep ahead in terms of operational excellence, our ability to respond to changing circumstances and our innovative approaches to lifesaving challenges. Simple ideas like adding reflective strips to IRBs will significantly enhance member safety during the many dusk and night time searches we perform. Training with other agencies improves our overall readiness and effectiveness in the event of major incidents and our credibility with these agencies continues to be improved with every interaction. We need to keep ahead and continue the momentum we have created over the past few seasons and carry it forward into the 2013/2014 season.

Again, I'd like to thank the LOC for the hard work they have put in. We have some departing members and their experience and passion will be missed. The current LOC has had representation from all corners of the region and this has made for some good debate and discussion on the operational topics discussed. The LOC; Tony, Jason, Lauren, Robyne, Nick and I would like to thank Tom, the staff at Northern and also the clubs. We are there to be your voice on operational matters and we continue to welcome the feedback received.

Outcomes from this season include:

SLSNZ REGIONAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME 'LEADERS FOR LIFE'

In Northern Region, the programme started in August 2012 with nine candidates from eight different clubs from around the region. Two project groups were formed to research two areas that they identified as pertinent to SLSNR strategic priorities, being Cultural Diversity within Surf Life Saving & Inter-Agency Communication.

In addition to the research projects, the programme consisted of four weekend workshops throughout the year.

The programme concluded in May, with both groups presenting their projects to the DOC, Board members and Club representatives. The research and work put into both projects will be applied: with a Diversity project being piloted this year in Northern Region, and the Inter-agency project group having presented to the Lifesaving Operational Committee and receiving guidance on how their work can be utilised in the near future.

Sport Report

Northern Region had an extremely busy surf sport season in 2012-13. The full event calendar included the bi-annual Trans-Tasman Tri Series which was this time hosted by Northern Region.

On several occasions the inclement weather proved the determinant in the locale of events, so despite the intention to have carnivals on the West Coast, all ended up being held on the East. As a result of a weather bomb the King of Rangitoto had to be cancelled.

The Whangamata Classic held pre-Christmas was again a resounding success with approximately 500 competitors taking part. This event has really developed and provides athletes with excellent early season racing and again was the first round of the Sonic Race Series.

In early January the Trans-Tasman Tri Series was held at Waipu, Omaha and Orewa. The competition provided by teams from NSW Country and Central Coast was fierce; however the Northern Region Team stayed determined and took out second place in the third test. The overall points were NSW Country Team 3 points, Central Coast Team 7 points and Northern Region Team 8 points. This was a great result for the team who continued to improve on each performance.

The Northern Region Championships were held at Ruakaka on the 16th and 17th of February, 580 competitors were entered from 17 Clubs, including Whangamata, Pauanui, Mt Maunganui, Omanu and Papamoa. There were 59 entries in the Masters Championships. The Champs programme again included IRB events. Three new events were added to the programme; 2km Beach Run, Mixed Double Ski and the Lifesaver Relay. This was the first time the Lifesaver Relay was run in New Zealand; this is a 9 person relay which includes a boat crew. Its inclusion provided a great finale to the Regional Champs.

At the SLSNZ National Championships in Mount Maunganui, Northern Region Clubs performed well with Red Beach placing 3rd, Mairangi Bay 5th and Piha 6th in the overall points.

Mention must be made of the Mairangi Bay Magic Women's Boat Crew who represented New Zealand at the Trans-Tasman Challenge at Waihi Beach on Saturday 9 February. The team held their nerve in a thrilling three race series to beat their Australian rivals from North Cottesloe in the final race. New Zealand's male representatives were Piha who faced off against Austinmer. The powerful Australian crew took out the series convincingly.

Duane Dalton (Mairangi Bay) and Jason Pocock (Mairangi Bay) were re-appointed as Selectors for SLSNZ for 2013/14. After being involved in the management team for Rescue 2012, Jason Pocock has also been re-appointed as the Assistant Coach for the New Zealand World Championship Squad.

Upon the completion of the SLSNZ National Championships, High Performance Squads were announced. The following athletes were named in the World Championship Squad for 2013/14; Chanel Hickman (Mairangi Bay), Nick Malcolm (Mairangi Bay), Danielle McKenzie (Mairangi Bay), Chris Moors (Red Beach), Kevin Morrison (Mairangi Bay), Samantha Richter (Mairangi Bay) and Kirsty Wannan (Piha). Kelsi Boocock (Red Beach) and Hannah Williams (Red Beach) were named in the New Zealand Development Squad for 2013/14.

On behalf of the Surf Sports Operational Committee, thank you to all the officials, volunteers, coaches, competitors and staff who work together and contribute to making surf sports the success it is.

Junior Surf Report

Another successful season with an increase of junior members from 1779 to 2150 for our 17 beaches spread across the Northern Region.

Junior members learning new skills in Surf Safety and training for regional events.

First the Twilight event held at Orewa on 30th November saw a good turnout of C Group juniors competing in beach sprints, surf race, board race, flags and diamond person.

The first Inter Club Carnival held at Red Beach saw another good turnout of juniors competing in Beach Sprints, Beach Flags, Surf Race, Board Race, Tube and Board Rescue and Board Relay.

The second Twilight event was held at Red Beach on the 14th December with another great turnout of competitors.

The third Twilight to be held at Mairangi Bay was unfortunately cancelled due to extreme weather conditions.

The 2013 year started well with another successfully run Carnival at Waipu Cove on the 12th January with juniors competing in surf race, board race, beach sprint, diamond

relay and cameron relay for B & C Groups.

Northern Region Junior Surf Championships and Cath & Eddie Millar Cup for 2013 held at Orewa saw 592 junior athletes compete in individual and teams events.

This season we have reaped the benefits of the highly trained event safety guards present at all events held throughout the region. Ensuring the safety of all in the water and the skills of setting perfect buoy lines and the ability to move with the change in conditions throughout the day's events assisted in the smooth running of events.

Phil Fraser again filled the role at of Event Referee along with Arena Referees working in well together throughout the season.

2013 saw an additional two qualified Level 2 officials in Junior surf along with numerous level 1 officials being signed off.

Bethells Beach hosted the West Coast Training day to over 100 U13 and U14 year olds providing training in challenging conditions prior to district champs and inter district at Mount Maunganui.

They also covered off a good portion of the modules within their workbooks through CPR and scenario's.

Thanks to my fellow committee members who have given up their time to ensure that Junior Surf continues to go from strength to strength.

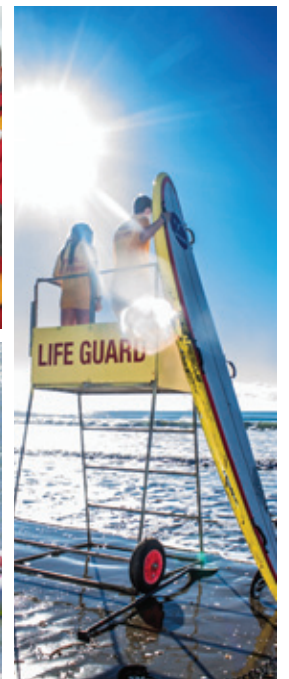
Junior Surf is what it is through it exceptional volunteers who give up their time as Coordinators, Coaches, Managers, Officials and Parent Helpers.

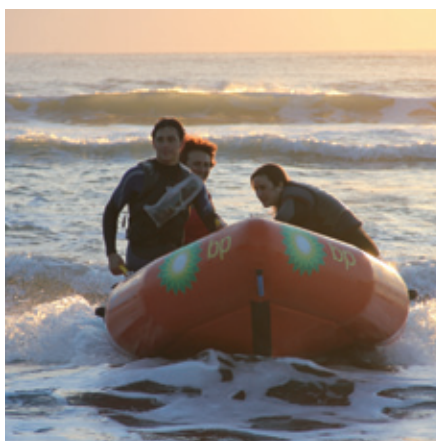

Coast, this is our environment and this is our first priority. We will never assume arrogance or pretence to know it all, as each season brings its own challenges which truly bring you back to ground level.

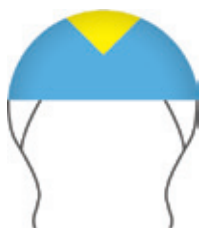

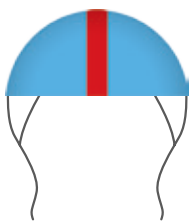
This has been another fantastic season, the club continues to grow and prosper and the future is looking sound; I look forward to seeing you all in 2013/2014.

This is what will really allow us to be the best club in New Zealand.

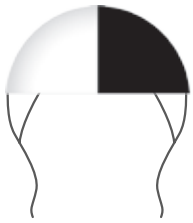

Muriwai

The 2012/13 year has defined the Muriwai Volunteer Lifeguard

Service as the largest and busiest patrolling club in New Zealand, as well as the most innovative and progressive. A summary of our activities and achievements makes impressive reading:

- The longest volunteer patrolling season ever undertaken by a club in New Zealand – 30 consecutive weekends.
- The highest patrol activity levels of any club in New Zealand.
- Completion and occupation of our new clubhouse and community facility – widely agreed to have set a new standard for surf life saving clubs worldwide.
- Delivery of two pioneering ‘diversification’ projects to involve Asian and Pacific communities in introductory surf life saving programmes.
- NZ’s first female muslim surf life saver, and first appearance of a red and yellow ‘burqini’ lifeguard uniform.
- Winning the nationwide public vote for most popularly supported club, winning a new BP IRB as a result.
- Putting NZ’s most highly specified, purpose equipped 4WD patrol / rescue vehicle into service.
- Adroitly managing the frenetic activity and sustained international media attention that followed NZ’s first fatal shark event in almost 40 years.
- Qualifying 37 new lifeguards, to bolster our patrolling ranks to almost 150 – one of the largest active patrolling bases of any NZ club.
- Growing our nipper membership to 230, taking our overall club membership to nearly 650, an all time high for our club.

The club’s successes over the past 12 months are built upon several key foundation stones:

A strong and popularly supported vision and sense of purpose – in May 2012 a large and broad cross section of club members collaboratively fashioned a fresh strategic plan, and set in place some stretch goals for the next few years, at the same time making it clear the club must strive to be fully inclusive of all members, and the local community.

Having the equipment necessary to effectively patrol and respond – we are fortunate to carry the enduring support of several long standing funders of key rescue and training equipment. Trillian Trust this year contributed in excess of \$90,000 toward our new 4WD response vehicle, fit-out of our unique teaching facilities, and sport equipment. ASB Community Trust, Auckland Council + ARAFA, NZLGB, SLSNR, and many others helped us to implement a carefully constructed asset management programme that ensures we have all the resources we require, in a high state of repair.

A strong and vastly talented volunteer base – our ability to deliver 5,156 hours of voluntary patrols lies in our large pool of committed lifeguards, and behind them a team of senior guards that lead, train, mentor, and fix. Our commitment to investing in training and leadership development pays regular dividends in that we have a constant in-flow of people ready to assume responsibility, and exercise innovative thinking.

Strong operational focus – our structure of 5 operating committees puts due focus on the core areas of lifesaving, sport, junior surf, membership, and finance and administration. More importantly, it allows a larger number of club members to be involved in shaping and developing the club than would otherwise be possible, and provides newer members with an opportunity to gain experience in club administration.

Exemplary administration – our financial management is of the highest level, due specifically to the talents and diligence of Hayley Clarke. Likewise, the way in which Pauline Butt deals to the secretarial function is unequalled. The nipper/junior surf section continues to be a self-managing and self-funding component of the club, not to mention the source of several talented parents who have been quick to pick up roles in other aspects of the club particularly around funding and event delivery.

Strong trust and credibility with key stakeholders – as the season unfolded we dealt with huge crowds and some of the busiest days in memory, punctuated by a drowning off Flat Rock, the rescue of a critically injured visitor from the Blowhole, and the February shark event. At all times our lifeguards – volunteer and paid – performed with the utmost professionalism, winning the praise of the other

emergency services, council parks staff, public onlookers, and the media. On more than one occasion Police handed operational management of major incidents to senior lifeguards, deferring to our undisputed expertise and local knowledge. We need to be immensely proud of our reputation, and the credibility we possess.

Leadership, and networks – the depth of leadership within our club, and the networks we possess regionally, nationally and internationally, are the envy of other clubs. We see the benefit of investing in the development of emerging leaders, and sharing our talented people with district and national boards and committees. We benefit immensely from the cross pollination of ideas, and being fully up to speed with developments and issues as they affect our organisation.

In May 2012 several long-serving club administrators signalled their desire to stand down from key roles in the coming 1-2 years, in a planned transition that has been termed 'Passing the Baton'. The 2013 annual general meeting will see the Chairman (Tim Jago) and Treasurer (Hayley Clarke) retiring, and strong candidates from the next generation of club leaders stepping into these key

leadership and management roles. To provide good continuity the President and Secretary will serve a further year. Concurrently, several foreseen retirements from the operational committees allows for an infusion of new talent and energy at this level also.

So in addition to being a defining year that has set Muriwai clearly at the forefront of surf life saving in New Zealand, this is the year in which the club implements a planned transition to a new generation of leaders. With strong finances, strong membership, strong community support, and a strong sense of purpose, the future of the club is itself very strong.

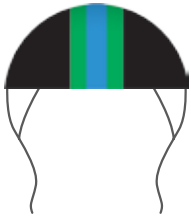

Our club database, there is still work to do but it is now fully updated and already we have seen positive results from this. We will again review our operations, guarding, club sectors, staffing, finance, operations, marketing and promotion, the clubhouse and its use. Information gathered is taken on board, reviewed and incorporated in planning, budgets and strategic plans moving forward.

Piha Board – Our GM and Board will not run a business model that commit costs ahead of having revenue, this is a risky model many organisations and clubs have made the mistake of doing. It is acknowledged nationally that grant incomes are under real pressure and at the moment prudently must be anticipated to this decline in the coming years. The Board is exploring new funding models and will be working with different club groups to getting a better spread of income. We are looking at a

number of different sustainable funding models.

To ensure our sustainable model we have produced a draft budget (to be confirmed by different sector leaders after our AGM) for our 2013/2014 season. The Board will critically review all aspects of the budget, particularly where not funded, whilst ensuring we can deliver on our core programmes and services. As I see it at this time the most crucial strategic issues we are facing (no particular order) are:

- 1 Ensure sustainable funding models. Deliver long term financial sustainability.
- 2 To position Piha SLSC as the number one SLSC in NZ. In junior development, patrolling and competition. Also increase parent involvement.
- 3 To ensure the Piha SLSC remains volunteer lead, professionally managed.
- 4 Recruitment and membership retention – the right balances in membership.
- 5 Getting our bar/restaurant operating as an enjoyable financially viable operation.

Piha SLSC is achieving in all operational areas. This year was difficult to secure the required funding to replace the roof of the club and plan to put in a new sewage and waste water system. The cost of this is in excess of \$130,000. Our GM and Board are working hard on new promotional and funding strategies to make our club even more exciting and future proofing Piha SLSC with sustainable funding models. There is always work to be done, but with positive people driving it and the right structures in place exciting times are ahead. Our surf sports side of the club keeps getting better and better. Thanks to Steve Ferg, Horse and Debi for managing the logistics around this. I would also like to thank our CC, VCC and PCs for doing a great job patrolling our beach. We had some tough times with drownings outside patrol hours or outside patrolled areas. It never fails to impress me how well our members deal with this and get on and do their job. Thanks to Eric and his professional team filming Piha Rescue. Do not under estimate the value of this programme to SLSNZ, SLSNR and Piha SLSC.

Piha SLSC is looking forward to our 2013/2014 season. Our 80th year of saving lives. We will start planning a

great function to celebrate this. There are a number of challenges facing us for this coming season. SLSNR has undergone a restructure. SLSNZ have many challenges around their revenue sustainability. Piha SLSC is motivated to keep on improving in all areas of operations. We are working hard to increase and diversifying our funding streams and partners.

Lastly I would personally like to thank our sponsors. Burger Fuel, Trillian Trust. The Trusts, Coverstaff, Coca Cola, The Mad Butcher, Autex-Greenstuf, Helelink, Jagermeister. Also to all our other smaller sponsors and supporters that help in some way, thank you very much. Also a big thank

you to Remuera Lions who have supported us to ensure we can fully resource our patrolling needs for this coming season.

Thank you all for patrolling, competing, training and supporting Piha SLSC, for a great season and keeping the people on our beach safe.

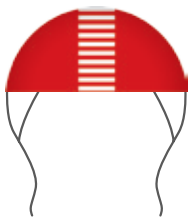

Red Beach

As has been well documented on the club website, the 2012/13 season was another very successful one for Red Beach.

The sports season appears to be stretching further and further at each end with the Northern Pool Championships in late August 2012, won jointly by Piha and Red Beach, and the Aussie Titles in April almost exactly eight months later where we collected bronze medals in the Men's U17 Beach Relay and Women's U17 Taplin Relay.

In between there were a number of highlights including: third places at both the ERC's and the Allan Gardner, a further nine national titles, successful defences of all three Northern District Titles (Junior, Senior and Masters) and our own Owen Chapman Carnival. These great club results were built on some fantastic team and individual results and we were all impressed with the performances of Chris Moors in the Australian Iron Man Series, Caitlin Ryan in defending her national open ski title and two of our younger athletes, Kelsi Boocock and Hannah Williams being named in the NZ Development Squad. Fittingly all four have achieved National recognition in Surf Life Saving and Kayaking.

Again we need to acknowledge the efforts of our head coach, Vaughan Skiffington for his commitment to our athletes in their activities both in and out of training and competition.

Lifesaving activities again included Pakiri Beach over the height of the season with total volunteer time over both beaches at 2,782 hours. Despite some serious incidents (successfully handled) and a strain on resources, patrolling at Pakiri has now become an established and enjoyable part of the summer season. An additional 32 lifeguards and 16 IRB drivers/crew qualified before and during the season and combined with some much needed additional equipment funded, thanks to an ASB Trust grant, eased the strain a little.

It was great to see the club recognised with the Gudsell Trophy post the 2011/12 season for the most number of new lifeguards (48) qualified in a season. Thanks to Chris Gurr who as well as finding time to make a pretty good espresso, again successfully managed our continually expanding life saving activities.

Despite falling just short of the last two seasons' wins in Ocean Athletes (2nd to Papamoa in a reverse of last year) the Juniors again made a clean sweep of the local competitions. This year we celebrated 40 years of Junior Surf at Red Beach and the club's future continues in good stead with a healthy 356 JuniorSurf members with parents, family and supporters contributing to another very successful season.

The club's strong financial position continues to be based on two main funding streams, our bar/dining facilities and as most members will be aware, an incredible band of loyal sponsors:

So in summary, another successful season and with lots planned for the future. Our 60th year was a great opportunity to reflect on past achievements and look forward to continuing the momentum and spirit that makes our club so successful.

We had a wonderful 2012–2013 season with lots of sun in the Christmas holidays and the water was still warm in April. The patrol season was great. We had the same 3 patrols this year, with Tania Ahrens taking over as PC from Ben who became VPC, and again they all worked well. Each patrol is quite unique. They each have their own different attributes and strengths. Statistics for the season were 2631 hours worked, 6 rescues, 17 first aids, 5 searches and 265 preventative actions. We have 258 members altogether, which is up on last season, made up of Active members, Associates, Junior Surf and all their parents. I would like to thank all the active lifeguards for all the time and effort they put into patrolling our beach last season. Everyone appreciates your dedication.

Junior Surf was co-ordinated by Kathleen Forsythe who once again did a fabulous job helped by her coaches; for Tadpoles – Neil Campbell, A Group – Tony Wilson & Selina Gordon, B Group Andrew Forsythe & Andrew Wright, C Group Paul Turner & Maysha Ahrens. Thank you for giving up your time each weekend to train our junior surf members. They are all very keen. We also appreciate the parents come along to support their children and do the jobs that are asked of them. Thank you.

We had an Open Day to start the season at Labour Weekend. We showed the public what we do at the club rather than just a registration day. This will become an annual event.

Leading up to the start of last season we began IRB training for an exam in Ahipara at the beginning of December. Each Sunday we held either training in the water or doing our booklets. We also had 2 training sessions on the west coast at Baylys Beach, carefully watched by John as our Instructor, Ben in training as an instructor and Tony as the organiser of the exam. Finally we headed up for the exam. We had a finishing school on the Saturday and the actual exam on the Sunday. There was huge surf and it was very scary for us east coast beach lifeguards, but a great experience. We all passed and after a fantastic weekend we got 7 new drivers, 2 new crewmen, an instructor and a trainee examiner. Far North Surf Rescue are a very hospitable bunch of people who really looked after us all.

We had a busy season once again with lots of fundraising activities and displays. Jandal Day was held in December we had 12 collectors and raised \$1230.70 for the club. Junior

Surf went door to door in Ruakaka and collected \$557.60. At the races we had a patrol on the beach so we were allowed to collect in the stands and we received \$497.10 in donations and the Waipu Anglican Church Opportunity Shop donated \$500 to us. We are very fortunate to have such a wonderful community supporting us every step of the way.



Gretchen did a terrific job of training our new lifeguards again and 9 qualified in February. We saw them helping out at many patrols after that. Well done all of you. We know you will stay with our club for many years to come. Tania Ahrens and Dene Green are now qualified as Surf Officials for Junior Surf Competitions. We had 6 schools come to our club for Beach Education. Junior Surf members attended a couple of carnivals and competed very well.

This season we only had 2 weeks of paid lifeguards at Christmas time. This did not go down well with anyone in the area and especially not the campers. There have been meetings in Whangarei since with WDC and NRC and they are looking into making sure that this does not happen again. We were very lucky nothing serious happened at the beach for the rest of January with all the holiday makers still in the area.

Tony and I attended the Farewell Cocktail party for the Refinery NZ CEO Ken Peters. It was an honour to be invited by our largest sponsor to attend such a prestigious event.

The club organised and subsidised new hoodies for the members. They look fantastic and are worn proudly by both young and older members.

Ryan Trounce has worked very hard to keep our website up to date with all that has happened in the club and there is a link to Facebook to keep members well informed. He is presently working on getting a webcam installed so we can

see what is happening at the beach with the tides and surf conditions.

In September a few of our executive committee members met with committee members of Whangarei Heads, Mangawhai Heads and Waipu Cove at the Waipu Pizza Barn to start an initiative to get all the clubs in the Bream Bay area to spend more time getting to know each other better. We planned a few events but it was only a month before the start of the season and many clubs already had their own club activities planned. However, we are still in the planning stage during the off season looking forward to next season. We did however have an inter-club competition on Good Friday with 8 members from each club doing water relay events, then a tug-of-war and an egg throwing competition. It was a wet horrible day but thanks to all that competed for us; even a couple of Junior Surf members making up the numbers at times. All clubs decided it was held too late in the season as many clubbies had gone back to Uni and winter sports had started so next year it will be held earlier. Mangawhai Heads won on the day and they will be hosting it next season.

In early January, with great weather, we held our Gala Day. It was another great success thanks again to Neil for organising the day and his helpers. We made \$1,691.00. It is a great PR day and the campers and locals enjoy it very much.

We continued with our bucket collections again this year through the camp and raised \$1,757.00. Thanks to the few clubbies that did turn up to help. We hope more will get involved next year.

Once again we held the Northern Regional Champs here at our beach. Thanks to everyone that helped make the day as successful as it was. The competitors and officials enjoy coming to our beach for the home cooking and hospitality. Rory won the Open Beach Flags which was fantastic. We competed in the IRB races and did very well. The girls team got a silver medal and the boys team got 2 silvers and 2 bronzes. The girls competed in the canoe and had a great time and it was a good experience for them for the future.

The IRB Nationals were held at Waipu this season and our teams competed again. The girls' team got into the semis and the guys' team made the quarter finals.

In March we went to an IRB exam at Bethells Beach and Joel Ahrens became a driver. John became a full examiner that day after assisting at 4 lifeguard & 2 IRB exams. He

is now only the 7th person in the last 5 years to become as examiner in the Northern Region and congratulations to him. There are many opportunities in surf that our members should be taking advantage of like the American Lifeguard Exchange and other training courses such as Patrol Captains, Senior, Intermediate and Junior Lifeguard weekends, Instructors etc. One of our new initiatives for the club is to ensure that our guards are as qualified as they possibly can be gaining knowledge and experience along the way.

Also in March we had our Junior and Senior Club Champs. Both days went off well but there was not a great attendance at either so we hope to hold these earlier during next season.

In April, 3 of our lifeguards Mikayla, Sam & Kate attended the 4 day Northern Region Youth Development camp, they had a wonderful time and gained lots of experience while met many other clubbies.

Also in April we had our club prizegiving, once again it was well attended. Jessica Andrews received the Nipper of the Year trophy and Tony Wilson was awarded the President's trophy, both well deserved.

We were the main benefactor of the markets this year. We received \$3300 in total to go towards club equipment, a big thank you to the markets committee for supporting us in such a great way.

We replaced our quad and obtained a Yamaha Rhino beach vehicle during the season. It is working out well. We have a new printer courtesy of Konica Minolta that makes Debbie's job easier and a new lawn mower to make the grounds look a lot tidier.

We have a great facility and the club was used for many birthdays again and other small functions.

The Management Plan for the club has been worked on very intensely. Sunset Beach

Over the past decade we have witnessed significant growth in the public numbers who recreate at Sunset Beach, beach attendance numbers are up 40% and in the summer of 2012/13 we were active in the ocean with 2,410 preventative actions involving 10,280 people.

In the summer of 2007/08 the volunteer lifeguards worked 2,623 hours. In 2012/13 this had increased to 3,571 volunteer hours worked. Such has been the demand on our services by the public from throughout the region the club has been required to extend our patrolling hours on the weekends.

With the growth planned for the Tuakau – Pokeno districts and with the advent of manufacturing moving into the area we anticipate even more extended numbers for next summer. To provide the services for safe ocean swimming

we are training new guards for the future to take up the responsibility.

This past summer Sunset won the Rescue of the Month on two occasions and the April Rescue involved ten fishermen trapped offshore on a rocky outcrop.

The erosion problem in front of the rescue tower continues to give us concern as to the future. The WDC has recently closed the lower car park which has resulted in a one way park access. With another busy summer predicted it is difficult to understand the Councils unilateral actions without consultation with the Club.

Our competition lifeguards had an outstanding season with NZ Titles gained in the IRB in all age groups and gender. Following a long wait we have now launched a surf boat with a young crew who are showing talent for a very good future.

Thanks must be extended to our principal sponsor Trust Waikato and our family of Sponsors including NZCT, the Cuesports Foundation and the Water Safety Foundation.

The lifeguards of Sunset Beach are grateful for the support of the Port Waikato Community and are ready again next summer to carry on the great traditions of saving life from drowning.

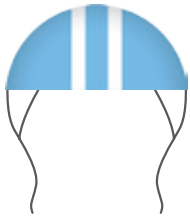
Finally, I would like to wish you all a successful forthcoming season and hope to see you at the beach during the summer months.

Whangarei Heads

I am very happy to report that Whangarei Heads VSLSP has had another successful season, which was busier than usual due to the fantastic summer weather, and solid easterly swell. Our guards again performed above and beyond the call of duty, some working an impressive number of hours, all maintaining the fantastic level of service that we pride ourselves on, which resulted in no serious incidents on the beach.

The club's new building plans are progressing well, with Resource and Building consents granted. Full plans have been completed, and now we need to raise just under \$400,000 to complete. We have had some good assistance from a local who has experience with gaming funding, and we can only hope that we get a good result from our current funding strategy, as the 10:20 strategy that has been developed for the Auckland clubs could make it difficult for non-Auckland clubs to complete capital works.



As a key volunteer, I was very concerned with the recent re-structure at SLSNR. While appreciating the need to future proof the organisation and reduce expenditure, the loss of so many lifesaving support staff could have a detrimental effect on delivery of some of the services that have become expected within SLSNR and were what made us arguably the best region in the country. I would like to see a fast return to organisational surplus so that we can re-focus our efforts on our core business, saving lives.

The summary financial statements are for the year ended 30 June 2013 and have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 43 Summary Financial Statements.

The summary financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis.

These summary financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (NZD) which is the Society's functional currency.

RELATIONSHIP TO FULL FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The summary financial statements were authorised by the Board on 27 August 2013 and these have been prepared in order to provide interested persons with a succinct overview of the past performance of the entity. The specific disclosures

have been extracted from the audited full financial statements dated 27 August 2013.

The full financial statements were prepared in accordance with NZ IFRS under NZ GAAP. The full financial statements were audited by BDO Auckland who issued an unqualified audit opinion. The Society is a public benefit entity.

The Society qualifies for differential reporting as it is not publicly accountable and it is not large as defined in the framework for differential reporting. The Society has taken advantage of all available differential reporting exemptions except that a cash flow statement is presented.
