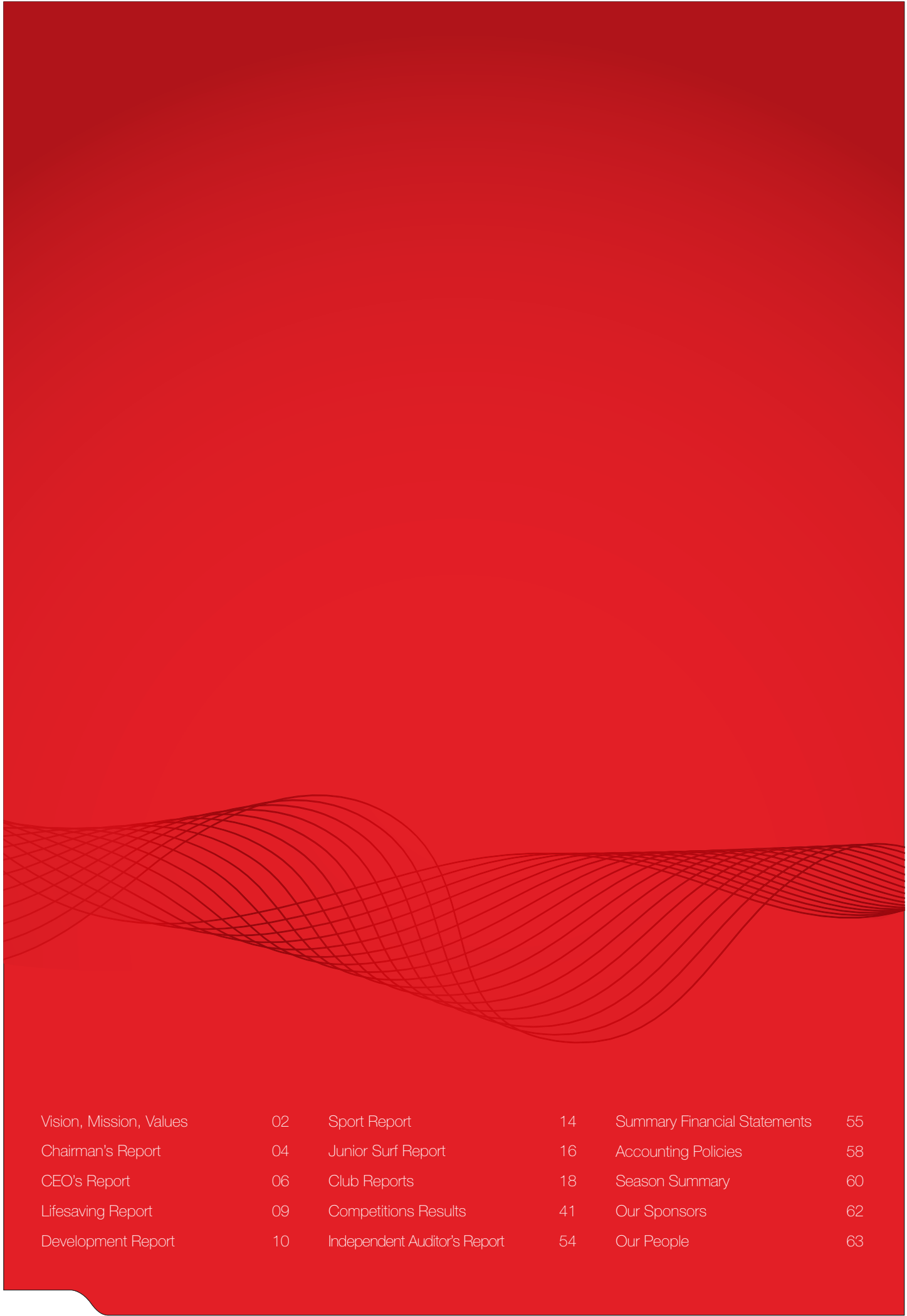




79th Annual Report 2012

Chairman's Report

The 2011/12 season has seen pleasing progress being made in important areas of Northern Regions planned activity. We have seen significant increases being achieved in membership recruitment, advances in administration and organisational practices across the Northern Region and most importantly, the high quality of lifesaving services being provided to the beach going public in the communities we serve.

In specific terms, the 17 clubs of Northern Region account for approximately 45% of the national lifesaving output, over our 6 month season.

These good results are the consequence of the positive and energetic nature of our membership. Notably, this season Pam Elgar joined us as CEO. Pam, along with the impressive work of our volunteer committees and the support of our professional team, have all contributed greatly to our progress. As we look to continue to build a strong network of clubs and lifeguards across the Northern Region, we will need to continue to apply our ethos of being "Volunteer Led and Professionally Managed".

Securing the funding needed to support the lifesaving services of Northern Region and its clubs continues to be a major challenge. Acknowledging this, the planning for a sustainable financial future for our clubs will continue to be a central objective for your incoming board.

We note that our national body, Surf Life Saving New Zealand, struggles to achieve consistency in the services

and funding redistributions it is able to provide SLSNR from year to year. The pattern that is emerging is of funding diminishment, cost transfer and the inconsistent application of subsidies nationally, all of which do not appear to reflect where the weight of lifesaving work (and therefore costs) is occurring. Your Board is committed to correcting this situation.

Conversely, our major regional funders and stakeholders are partnering with us in many exciting initiatives that will allow us to increase on a planned basis the number of beaches patrolled, and to extend programmes and services delivered collaboratively with our 17 clubs. It will be important for us to build on this support from our local councils, regional business sector and donor organisations if we are to meet the expectations of the nearly 2 million New Zealanders that we strive to serve each year.

On that note, I would like to formally thank all of our sponsors and funders who have supported us over the past season. As the population we serve in the Northern Region continues its significant rate of growth, the importance of your support also grows.

In conclusion, on behalf of the Board of Northern Region I would like to acknowledge and express deep gratitude to all of our clubs and patrolling club members, whose skill and sense of duty defines us as a movement.

CEO's Report

The 12 months covered by this report has seen significant changes within Surf Life Saving Northern region. The region continued to provide a high quality service to the public through the delivery of its programmes and services in a cost effective manner to the satisfaction of our members, funders and many stakeholders.

Our organisation will always be judged on the effectiveness of our beach patrols and the surf lifesaving services we provide. We can be proud of the work over the 24 week season.

This past season was unfortunately marred by a poor summer with many wet and windy days on our beaches. Never the less our patrols provided 88,049 hours of patrols throughout the summer.

478 people owe their lives to our outstanding lifeguards and the invaluable service that they perform.

GOVERNANCE

The Board continued its work in delivering plans to make the constitutional changes required to ensure SLSNZ remains a strongly self-governing and self-administering organisation. A key development was my appointment as CEO.

The ethos of Volunteer led professionally managed is clearly demonstrated in the governance structure of the Board supported by Operational and Standing Committees who provide the vital role of ensuring that the views and opinions of our members and clubs are utilised in the delivery of our programmes.

Thanks must go to all the volunteers who give many hours to support the on-going development of our Region.

LIFESAVING

Despite the weather over an inclement season 88,049 patrol hours delivered 478 rescues, 695 first aids, 114 searches and over 28,140 preventative actions. 99%

of the activity at our beaches is geared to prevention – stopping people getting into a situation that may demand a rescue. Regardless of that, there are times when our lifeguards are asked to put themselves into dangerous situations in order to save others. Our guards respond willingly and competently. We must commend them for what they do and encourage them to continue to develop their skills to ensure they are equipped to handle any situation that may arise.

Demand for our lifesaving service continues to grow; we must ensure we are ready to face the challenge.

The professional mid-week lifeguard service was extended to cover 25 beaches and over 95 seasonal staff. The busiest beaches were patrolled for 15 weeks.

SPORT

Our athletes continue to enjoy competing both as individuals and for clubs. Our clubs achieved well overall at SLSNZ Championships with three clubs in top 10 (Red Beach 4th, Mairangi Bay 5th, Piha 6th), next was Orewa in 11th.

Surf League results saw more success with the outcome as below.

OCEANS

Red Beach 1st, Orewa 3rd equal, Mangawhai Heads 12th, Mairangi Bay 13th, Muriwai 19th, Bethells Beach 25th equal.

We have two athletes in Development Squad and five athletes in World Champs Squad.

Alongside our Athletes in NZ squads we have Jason Pocock as SLSNZ Team coach, Duane Dalton as SLSNZ selector and Zane Boon as National event referee.

We also had Northern Region athletes competing at Australian Nationals with good success.

At a regional level, our competitions were well attended

with 266 entries to Pool Champs, over 400 entries for Northern Region champs and 634 entries for Junior Surf Championship held at Orewa in February.

Sport is our core part of our movement and key to our recruitment and retention strategy. It provides a fabulous opportunity for our lifeguards to practise their skills in a competitive environment whilst keeping their physical fitness at peak standards. We are thankful for the great athletes we have and will work hard to ensure we continue to develop this part of our organisation.

It would be remiss not to mention the officials, coaches, administrators who give of their time to provide the framework for competitions to run efficiently. Thank you all.

JUNIOR SURF

Our Junior Surf programme is a real strength of the region a fantastic programme supported by a large number of officials and helpers.

We have over 350 young people involved in Sunday morning nippers programme. Our placing's at Oceans competition is a reflection of the depth of our junior athlete programme.

Thank you to the committee of Junior Surf who have managed this programme with great success.

FUNDING

No community organisation can function without the support

of core corporate partners, sponsors, funders, donors and supporters. We are extremely grateful for all the support we have received over the 2011-12 year. Without this support the exceptional level of programmes and services delivered by Surf Life Saving Northern Region would not be possible.

Special thanks must go to the Auckland Regional Amenities Funding Board who provided \$995,000 (39% of our overall funding). \$200,000 of this went direct to clubs. We received further funds from another six Territorial Local Authorities (Hamilton City Council, Waikato Regional Council, Waikato District Council, Far North, Kaipara and Whangarei District Councils) and we thank them for their support also.

Our principal gaming funder, Trillian Trust has continued its support committing over \$285,000 excluding grants made directly to clubs. This is a significant contribution and one that SLSNR appreciates.

Thanks must also go to Lion Foundation, Pub Charity, Tennyson Trust, and Oxford Sports Trust who have supported us with grants this year.

Tip Top has been a strong supporter particularly with our Junior Surf programme and providing support at our annual Awards of Excellence evening. We look forward to growing this relationship in future years.

SURF EDUCATION

This has been an area of growth for us and we believe we have a core responsibility to provide our three programmes of Surf to School, Beach Education and City Nippers. These programmes are ably delivered by our instructors through our clubs sharing lessons on safety at our beaches for over 8000 school children

FINANCIAL

The financial statements detailed later in the Annual Report represent another solid performance from the organisation in a challenging financial environment. Income was slightly down on 2010/11.

However the emphasis on tight financial controls has resulted in a net surplus of \$38,910.

We were again able to provide our non-Auckland clubs an unbudgeted operational grant totalling \$50,000 from general funds.

I would like to specifically thank Fiona Little for her attention to detail in managing the accounts of SLSNR over the past year and the on-going oversight and guidance provided by Board member Susanna Stuart.

CONCLUSION

Starting as CEO for SLSNR in the middle of the season has been challenging. I am extremely grateful to all the Board members however a specific thank you to Stephen Smith and Tim Jago who were always available to give me the context and background to events and allowed me the time to find my feet.

Specific mention must be made to the staff of SLSNR who delivered outstanding results in difficult circumstances. Thank you all. I wish to particularly single out two staff Travis Mitchell and Hayden Rawcliffe both of whom carried a heavier load during the year prior to my appointment in December.

I am proud to be part of Surf Life Saving Northern Region.

GOING FORWARD

2012/13 year is going to be another challenging year financially. However SLSNR will be continuing to implement our strategic priorities and management plan to deliver on our key platforms of club sustainability, quality lifeguards, community education, sport and leadership programmes.

Lifesaving Report

The 2011/2012 season saw the LOC pick up where we left off and continue on with some great initiatives. Tom Burgess has provided fantastic support in his role for the LOC.

Despite the global upheaval, Northern Region lifeguards again outdid themselves. Volunteer hours were up by almost 7,000 hours this year with 88,049 hours logged. Rescues (478) and preventatives (28,140) trended down again this year as lifeguards across the Northern Region continued their more proactive approach towards their beaches and the public continued to listen to our water safety messages. People involved in preventatives is back down to a more reasonable 96,741

The ASB Trust application was reviewed and the process continues to improve year on year with most applications able to be met. ASB approved exactly what we asked for, so that is seen as a sign they understand we have a thorough process and we do not ask for superfluous items. Clubs are on board with the process of getting rid of unserviceable equipment and requesting it replaced rather than holding onto unsafe equipment "just in case". This was an area LOC focussed on to ensure the continued safety of our members when using equipment for patrols. Unsafe/Unserviceable equipment is exactly that and we do not want to see lifeguards put at risk. We will keep focus on this area.

Major work items that are starting to see good traction are event lifeguard up skilling and the RWC review. For event guarding, our focus here is on member safety first and foremost. Having a dedicated team with specialist training

acknowledges the very important role event guards play and also gives them the tools to do their job. An added benefit for officials is going to be better continuity from event to event as the water arenas are set out by these important teams. Buoy colours and layouts should see a more standardised look and feel.

The RWC review is focussed on the training, equipment and use of the RWCs and the lifeguards who volunteer for this team. A new training program is underway and Dan and Rob have brought some good information back from California that will be assessed further and blended into the upcoming seasons.

The coming season will again be busy. We say that every year, and each year it proves to be true. We ask a lot from our membership and as committees, volunteers and paid staff, we need to ensure we are focussing on what is best for the clubbie on the beach. Are we doing right by our membership? What can we do to enhance their patrols, their safety, their competitions and most of all, their enjoyment? A happy clubbie is one who will go the extra mile and stay loyal to our movement. Having seen the dedication and passion from various different committees and staff this year, I'd say we are in good hands. Let's keep it up.

Finally, I'd like to thank the LOC for the hard work they have put in. We have some big challenges to nail down.

Development Report 2011

It has been a challenging year for DOC in progressing leadership opportunities in the Northern Region, however there are a number of new and exciting developments underway that will be in place for next season.

LEADERSHIP REVIEW:

This was essentially a needs analysis of leadership development activities within Northern Region which for the first time gave our members the opportunity to give their views on what they would like to see as part of an improved leadership programme.

Key themes from the review include:

- Clubs unaware of other leadership development opportunities, and if they do know about it they do not utilise them due to time of year and unable to commit during the season.
- Need for an identified mentoring pathway for all

leadership roles i.e. new board member or patrol captain

- Membership Development activities need to be open to all members irrespective of age
- Members would like to see workshops available on a range of topics including conflict resolution; event management; media training, networking, succession planning; management and governance skills for new board members; conflict management and motivation

This information was gathered by a survey open to all members and by club interviews. This review process has provided some very valuable information and is currently being used to inform the improvement of the senior leadership programme in particular. This information will also feed into the club sustainability.

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CAMP:

The Youth Development Camp has continued to grow from strength to strength. This year the inclusion of 11 young people from outside of Northern Region provided another insight and opportunity for our young members



to learn more about other clubs and extend their networks. The camp programme was revised as part of the Leadership Review and activities were chosen that provided the chance for all team members to develop their leadership skills and challenge themselves in a new environment. There was an emphasis on values of the organisation and all team members set goals for during the camp and for during the coming season. Each club has been sent their candidates goals and instructor feedback and we would encourage you to follow up and provide support to your members to achieve their identified goals this season. We had a very dedicated and enthusiastic group of instructors and I would like to thank you for taking time out of your week to provide your own leadership skills and expertise to our up and young leaders.

SLSNZ REGIONAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME 'LEADERS FOR LIFE'

This programme is part of a national leadership programme that has been funded from a grant from the Government. There are 4 regional leadership programmes being run throughout the country. In Northern Region, the programme started in August 2012 as we allowed for the Leadership Review to be completed and for a robust application process to be put into place. This is a 6-8 month programme, in which the candidates work on chosen projects that align to SLSNR strategic priorities.

Congratulations to the following people for being selected onto the programme. We look forward to hearing more about your projects in the coming months.

The Buddy Lucas Scholarship is a leadership scholarship awarded to outstanding young leaders from within SLSNR who demonstrate high leadership skills.

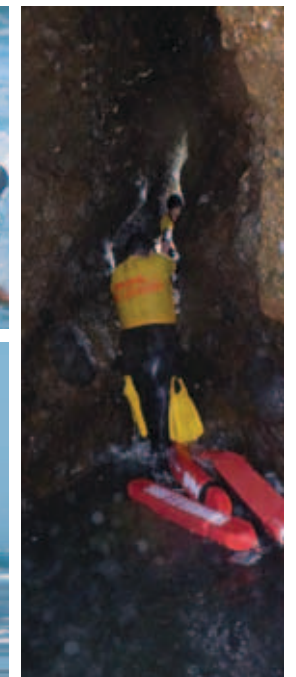
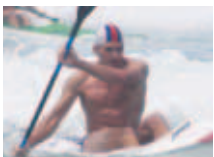
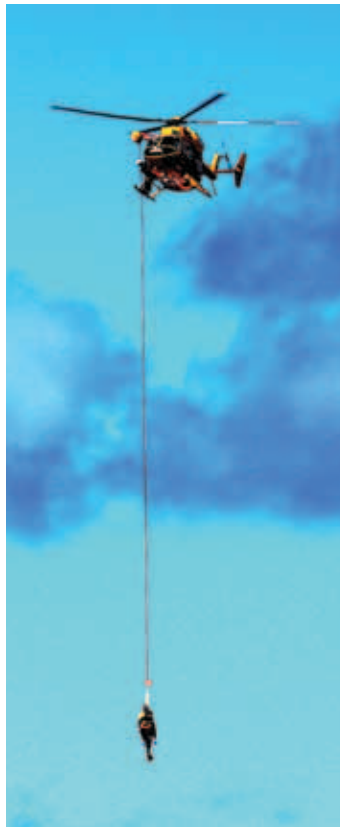

Sport Report 2012

The 2012 surf sport season was again very busy, with many events, most weekends, at a variety of locations throughout the Northern Region.

The Northern/Eastern Region carnival at Whangamata, yet again proved to be extremely successful with increasing numbers of competitors from all over the North Island. This carnival provides athletes with an excellent pre-Christmas competition and with the inclusion of the first round of the Sonic Race Series, it produced some real quality racing.

The Northern Regional Champs at Ruakaka had thirteen Northern Region clubs in attendance, as well as athletes from Mount Maunganui, Papamoa, Omanu and Westshore. With a round of the Sonic Race series being included at NRC's the quality of competition was of a very high standard.

Special mention must go to the Piha A Boat Crew who dominated the New Zealand and Australian boat crews. This crew won the first round of the New Zealand surf boat series in Wellington and then again at Piha to win the New Zealand Surf Boat series title. They won two gold medals at the National Championships over the short and long course, they then headed across the ditch to compete in the Australian titles and they won men's open ASRL Surf Boat title, which has never been achieved before by a New Zealand crew.

Northern Region teams yet again performed well at the Lion

Foundation Surf League. The highlight performance from the Northern Region teams was achieved by the Under 14 Team, winning their event. The Under 16 Team placed second in the Under 16 event, the Under 19 Team placed fourth in the Under 19 Surf League event (third place New Zealand team) and the Open Team placed third in the Open Surf League event.

More depth needs to be developed and rebuilt in the Under 19 and Open age groups moving forward and retention of our athletes is also very important.

A number of Northern Region athletes were selected for the Rescue 2012 New Zealand Squad; Steven Ferguson, Kevin Morrison, Chris Moors, Chanel Hickman and Maddie Boon. The Rescue 2012 Under 20 New Zealand Squad included Emily Hodges and Danielle McKenzie. Huge congratulations to all these athletes!

On behalf of the Surf Sports Operational Committee, thank you to all the officials, volunteers, coaches, competitors and staff who work together and contribute to making surf sports the success it is.

Junior Surf Report 2012

A successful season saw some 1,779 Junior Surf members take to the 17 beaches in the Northern Region to learn surf safety, survival skills and challenge themselves at competition conducted throughout the region from Waipu Cove to Kariotahi.

JOC was again challenged with growing numbers in our sport. This requires greater infrastructure, both at club and at a regional level.

The District Champs and Cath & Eddie Millar Cup were run in conjunction this year over 2 days. Orewa hosted the event which saw 628 athletes participate in a variety of individual and team events. Ensuring that there were adequately qualified officials, water safety and IRB's to cover all seven arenas is an ongoing challenge.

As this was a combined event, selected events carried Millar Cup points, whilst all events scored district champ points and placing. The aim of integrating these events, was so more clubs and participants had the opportunity to compete for the Millar Cup. Last year saw only 6 clubs participated in the stand alone Millar cup event. This year all entrants to district champs had the opportunity of scoring Millar cup points. Spectator interest was higher because of the combined nature of this event.

After the efforts of JOC in previous seasons in response to some unfortunate unsportsmanlike behavior, 2012 was free of such incidents. All competitions generally ran smoothly, given the number of competitors and conditions. It is critical that the standard and number of officials provided by each club is monitored to keep events well organized.

2012 saw a dramatic increase in qualified level 2 surf officials in junior surf. Junior surf now has 4 qualified, level 2 officials with the possibility of another 4 joining the rank this coming season. Phil Fraser and I alternated the carnival referee position. Numerous new level one officials were qualified and mentored into key roles around the beach.

Kariaotahi hosted a one day west coast coach skills and surf experience training day. This event targeted U13 and U14

competitions, to provide training in challenging conditions prior to the national championships and U14 Inter district competitions at Mount Manganui. This was excellently supported by some of our elite senior athletes from the region who provided coaching assistance. It provided great training and I hope this event is supported into the future as it has many great benefits to surf lifesaving in general. The aim for the future would be to have this event hosted by different west coast clubs from season to season.

The U14 Inter-districts event at Mt Mangangui saw the U14 team win for the second year in a row. Thanks to Mike Johnston who coached and Lianne Wilson for managing this team.

Thanks to my fellow committee members who have worked tirelessly to ensure that Junior Surf continues to go from strength to strength.

Junior surf is what it is because of its wonderful volunteers who give up their time as coordinators, coaches, managers and officials – so thanks everybody for your efforts over the past season.

It has been a pleasure to Chair the Junior Surf Operational Committee over the past 2 years. Three of the existing committee will be joined by two new members to take junior surf forward in the year ahead.

Bethells Beach

Another fantastic season and contribution from every one of the Bethells team, from the junior members to the seniors, all put in a massive drive to get to the platform we now have. It is extremely satisfying especially as I now step down from the Presidential role and be able to pass the baton to Adi Jenkins knowing that the club is in a very strong position.

Achievements for the season, well there have been many. We made to a focus to achieve Club of the Year and although I will say the result was disappointing it was fantastic to see that we made the finals as well as Best Patrolled Beach for a third season running. Regarding the Patrol inspections, Bethells had five audits carried out, all were 100% passes. In addition to the local audits, Bethells had supported Raglan for a weekend patrol in January and on that weekend a random Beach Inspection was completed by the Bethells Lifeguards – 100% pass was registered to Raglan on behalf of Bethells Beach.

Other key milestones that Bethells achieved in the season were:

- 90 Mile IRB Challenge – Six teams competed, in total 50+ competitors and supporters.
- Sports participation outside of the surf boat arena (what has been in the past)
- Pool Champs
- IRB Competitions (under 21 and open/masters teams)
- Patrol Champs
- Northern Region champs
- Ocean Athletes
- National results at the Surfboat arena
- Patrolling Life Guards – Year on year growth. 2010 season saw 28 new life guards qualify, 2011 another 22 qualified, 2012 a further 25 lifeguards qualified
- IRB Operators and crew – Six new Operators and 4 new Crew
- Instructors
- Seven new surf life guard instructors
- One new IRB instructor
- Examiner
- One new IRB & Lifeguard Examiner
- Refreshed Lifeguards
- This year 105 refreshed lifeguards (up 21 on last year)
- IRB refreshed – 23
- Integration of five new American based lifeguards – completing their NZ surf lifeguard award and IRB Operators for two.
- Another Buddy Lucas winner – Sam Comport
- The Triple A's – Part of a retention program that was created to attract the members who had left the club to start their own families. This program has been designed as an 'excuse' for these families to return to the beach with their pre-schoolers and involve/teach some basic skills to their young families. It is designed to bridge the gap between the patrolling stages (pre-kid patrolling & family patrolling).
- The BLITS team (Bethells Lifeguard Intermediate Training Squad) - Again a new initiative to start in the new season.
- For intermediate patrolling guards who want extra training and adventures and ideally have 1 – 2 years patrolling experience.
- 6 – 8 x 2 hour sessions every 2nd Saturday over December/January/February (break over Christmas).
- Scenarios & best practice workshops
- Designed for a chance for older experienced members to get to know the up and coming clubbies and work together to help strengthen the patrols.

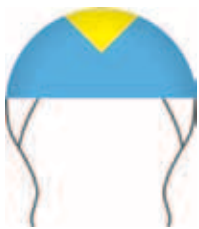

Karekare Surf Lifesaving Club has had an excellent year. The beach has again been patrolled to a very high standard, in spite of difficult conditions. While more preventatives were carried out, there were few major rescues required.

Our membership has grown to record levels with 309 financial members. A particular strength is the growth in nipper and junior surf numbers. The high interest in this part of the Club's activities has seen a return to nipper competition and most importantly nipper and junior surf parents' interest in the Club's administration and gaining lifeguard qualifications themselves. This is very positive for the future of the Club.

A key activity last year was our Club organising the lifeguarding for the opening of the Wynyard Quarter and for the Rugby World Cup. This involved 52 lifeguards from 8 different Auckland clubs. This is the main reason why we all become surf life guards and epitomises the Surf Life Saving New Zealand motto "In it for life". The quote that summed up everything the following weekend came from TV One's Mark Sainsbury who said "You can't trust them with alcohol, you can't trust them with your car, but this summer you will be trusting them with your life"

Our young lifeguards make up the majority of our patrolling numbers so need all the support that we as a club and older members can provide them.

LIFEGUARD ACTIVITY

Congratulations to Mike Lawrence and his team of Patrol Captains and of course all the lifeguards who contributed voluntary, callout and event guarding hours during the season.

This year saw the introduction of 5 patrols carrying out one patrolling day every third weekend. While one day patrols seemed to be favourable with most guards we did struggle on occasions to get patrolling numbers.

Mike and his team have reviewed this season and no doubt we will see the results of this review in the new season to come.

Rescue statistics are very similar to last year, what is notable is the increase in preventative actions to almost double that of the previous season.

The club was successful in receiving the November/winter rescue of the month for SLSNR and also for SLSNZ; this was great reward and recognition for the efforts that went into the Labour Day tragedies both those guards involved.

What was also pleasing at the time of writing is the club has received the SLSNR rescue of the month award for April, again proving that we have a well skilled level of guards on the beach.

POWERCRAFT

The club experienced challenging times in December when it was informed by Northside Liquidators that the Pukekohe Yamaha dealership that we had been dealing with for 5 years or more had gone belly up.

What made this news devastating for the club was that the month before we had paid \$9,000 to the company to secure a new season Yamaha Rhino.

With some hard bargaining with the liquidators and Yamaha NZ we saw the eventual release of a motorbike to the club

We are happy to report that we have entered into a new relationship with another Yamaha dealership that has just started up in Papakura who are more than willing to work with us.

Ben as our Head of Powercraft has done an excellent job in maintaining and servicing all the craft to a fully operational standard.

Finally to all our club members, junior surf parents and families who contribute to the club in one way or another to make Surf Life Saving Kariaotahi a great club.

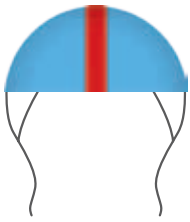

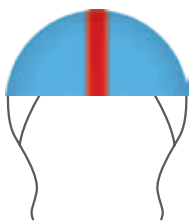

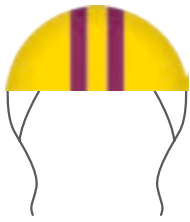

An impressive performance at the 2012 Surf Life Saving Awards of Excellence in which the Muriwai Volunteer Lifeguard

Service dominated the patrolling and life saving suite of awards, won the Innovation and Volunteer of the Year awards and several other achievement related awards is irrefutable evidence that our club remains at the forefront of surf life saving nationally and internationally.

To ensure that the club remains focussed and well equipped to continue performing strongly, there has been considerable effort over recent months to devise a new plan that sets a fresh vision together with dynamic goals for the club to strive toward. Four motivating factors emerged strongly in the group sessions held to construct the plan:

- Being bold and brave in all that we do.
- Setting higher standards in our patrolling and membership development activities.
- Equipping and coaching our competitors to win on the national and international stage.
- Preparing the next generation of leaders and administrators so that the 'baton change' occurs seamlessly and in a planned way.

The 2012 annual meeting marks the retirement of several key administrators. Fortunately the club has depth, and we have been able to identify and bring on board their replacements over the winter months to ensure there is no loss of momentum going in to the 2012/13 season. This said, several other key administrators have signalled they too are contemplating stepping aside in the foreseeable future, so there is a very clear need for the club to continue developing the emerging leaders that will assume the responsibility of taking the club forward. Our planning recognises and caters for this.

Without doubt the highlight of the past year has been the commencement of construction of our new clubhouse. The club is indebted to the work of the Muriwai Lifeguard Service Amenities Trust that since 2009 has worked assiduously to secure the right site, obtain consents, build the funding base and align everything so the instruction to start work could be given.

The new facilities will bring us closer than ever before to the Muriwai community, as the new premises will be the home of several other local organisations and made available for a wide range of community activities. Because the new facilities are owned and administered by the Trust - and shared with other users - there will be a necessary and substantial change to the way in which the club lives and behaves within its new home -

something we will have to quickly come to understand and reflect in our activities and operations once we move in.

Not surprisingly, the new clubhouse development has placed a strain on the club's finances in the past year, and will do so again in the coming year as we pay our share. Upon completion a total of \$6 million of cash and donated goods and services will have been expended over several years on the design, consents processes and construction of the new buildings and fit-out. Several grants and donations that would normally be applied to club operating costs have out of necessity been directed to building project costs. The audited accounts that accompany this report show that in the 2011/12 financial year the club converted a \$70,496.29 loan to the building trust into a grant. The club's equity position will next year take a further hit when it will be necessary to write off the remaining \$142,000 value in the current clubhouse upon its demolition.

It is appropriate to note that whilst the accounts show an overall operating loss of \$117,242 there are sound explanations, specifically:

\$70,496.29 loan to the trust converted to a grant (written off)

\$81,145.88 of depreciation – much related to our heavy investment in the previous two years in new rescue and sports equipment in anticipation of 'lean times' during the clubhouse building period.

\$24,695 of lifesaving equipment repairs and maintenance – steeply up from \$7,425 the previous year. Whilst there was



investment in upgrading existing equipment to extend its life, the reality is we abused equipment and paid the price. This is a focus area for improvement in 2012/13.

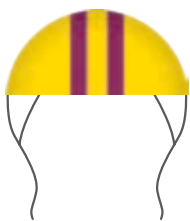
\$42,000 of grant funding deferred by agreement with the donor (and now banked in the 2012/13 year)

Our sport and competition endeavours produced mixed results. Our IRB racing teams again proved we are the best in our region by taking out the overall district honours. Our surf boat rowers performed with distinction throughout the year and at the NZ Championships - to get into four national finals and to win the U21 women's long course event and rank 3rd club overall is a great accomplishment for a club that only returned to this discipline 3 years ago.

Our performances in the swim, board, ski and beach arenas were below expectations. This is no reflection on our coach, David Butt, who worked tirelessly to give our small team of competitors a full coaching programme and excellent gear. We need to confront the challenge of (re) creating a team that comprises skills in all disciplines, so that we can be truly competitive in both individual and teams events, across all arenas and age groups. To achieve this we need to target our recruitment toward young members that have the base skills, strength and speed, and hard attitudes necessary to win. It is also acknowledged that there needs to be more focus and edge put into the training that the club provides to our nippers and junior surf competitors if they are to have the skills, strength and confidence to win in their competitions.

If there is a disappointing aspect to club administration this past year, it is that the various operational sub-committees, without exception, failed to fire. Much of the burden of delivering the various portfolios (lifesaving, junior surf, sport, finance, property, membership development) fell to the convenors of those committees, together with a few motivated individuals. Your management board found itself overly-involved in the day to day management of those portfolios, and this has seen just 5-6 people shouldering an immense and unfair workload. Rightly or wrongly, your management board has acted over recent times to identify those people with the capability and capacity to discharge these roles, and ask them to step forward. We have been gratified by the response, and are very confident the club has the leadership and management wherewithal to rejuvenate the operational committees in short order.

This AGM sees us finishing another season at Omaha. Again it has been another year of positive and satisfying progress in the history of the club.

A quick summary of some of the notable events to recap on:

1. The final stages of the renovation. This is a massive achievement for the club and came about after many hundreds of hours of work not only fundraising to make the money to pay for it but also all the planning, obtaining resource consents and permits, working through numerous issues with the neighbours and then the actual renovation of the club house and the building of the disabled access which required project management by myself and Duncan Napier.

I think you will all agree the club is looking fantastic and is a far different club house to one it was when I took on the role as club president 5 years ago. It is great to see the club being widely used by all the members and the wider community.

All the pre construction work was done at no cost to the club saving us around \$100,000. Thanks to our sponsors, Hutchinson Consultants who did all the engineering work, Graham Sawell from Pyramidz Architecture who has completed all the architectural work. Rodney District Council (in particular Penny Webster) who waived all our building consent fees saving us thousands.

I must give a massive thanks to Duncan Napier who has managed the financial side of the project and assisted me in the project management on a day to day basis. Over the last year Duncan and I have met on a almost daily basis to discuss the ongoing work at the club and how we would pay for it. People just don't understand how much work it takes to run a club this size never mind undertaking a renovation of this scale. I also must thank Sarah Napier, Duncan's wife who has allowed him the time to assist me and lastly my wife Jenny who has completed funding applications securing the club around \$95,000 in funding this past year. She also has had to put up with me being away from the family on many occasions. The renovation is now complete, apart from some minor cosmetic issues such as floor coverings. We have spent around \$400,000 and the club owes no money. This is a massive achievement and I can only hope that everyone appreciates the club and looks after it.

2. The open day. Great turn out and well done to Nicola for doing a great job in welcoming the club families and supporters to a new season. This was a well organised machine and we

presented as a very professional club. Great to see so many new faces at the club.

3. Jandal Day. This event was organised and run by our fundraising co-ordinator Fiona Angus. She did a fantastic job rounding up the troops and doing the rounds collecting funds and visiting schools. Well done and thanks to all who helped out.

4. The Auction Night: This year we downgraded the event taking the numbers down from the 420 last year to 180 this year. We had the event at the Stables Restaurant in Matakana. Thanks to Rhys Darby who again acted as our MC. We raised around \$48,000 for the club and a further \$20,000 for Jesse from Wellford. This event is our biggest fundraiser and takes a lot of input from myself and a tight lifeguard team headed up by Nick Carroll. I must also thank our Sponsor Bayleys who really stepped up to the plate this year and ran an awesome event. Mark Macky from Bayleys does a huge amount in the community and is involved in numerous auctions and fundraisers. I must say I was very proud of the team of lifeguards and how hard they worked on the night.

Planning for the Auction 2012 is already underway with us looking to take it to the golf course.

CLUB COACH

This season also saw us appoint a club Coach, Lorretta Hogg. This came about after Jenny Williams submitted a funding application to Rodney District Council for funding. We got the largest grant in the district being awarded \$20,000.

Lorretta has done a great job in coaching the "C" group kids. She has also provided board training, swim training, and ocean swim training.

We have been informed by Auckland Council that it is unlikely that funding will be available this coming season so for the training to continue it may have to be on a user pay basis.

JUNIOR SURF

Another great season for Junior surf. This season saw us kick off with 6 new paddle boards at a cost of \$11,000 to the club. These boards have been well used, although we did have to spend around \$3,000 on repairs for these boards.

As outlined above the club appointed a coach and this has worked very well.

Thanks to Nicola for her continued hard work and dedication to Junior Surf. Nicola had a serious traffic accident earlier this year and had to resign from her position as Junior co-ordinator. Over

the past 5 years Nicola has worked very hard for the club and put in huge hours helping the club to grow. Nicola is resigning from the committee and her energy and enthusiasm will be sadly missed. From the committee and the club as a whole I want to thank Nicola for all that she has done and wish her the best for the future.

Thanks to all the coaches and managers for doing such a great job on the beach every Saturday morning and helping to run the numerous events we have at the club.

Thanks to Gera who took over when Nicola had to stand down.

LIFEGUARDING

Wow another great year for recruiting new lifeguards to the club. Debbie and Patrick continue to work tirelessly to encourage new lifeguards to take up the challenge, and this has resulted in strong growth in our lifeguard numbers. It's great to see the growing number of both senior and junior lifeguards, both areas that we have previously lacked numbers in. We now have 39 patrolling lifeguards which is the ideal number Northern Region say we should have to run our club. This is a huge achievement considering 4 years ago we were down to around 10 lifeguards and struggling to keep the doors open.

We have had a good year with very few issues. The year ahead will see exciting changes with Matt Hunt taking over as President and some new energy from Rob Burt and Clinton Toi when they take over as joint club captains.

I would like to recognise and thank Carl Maskell for his hard work and dedication this season. Carl was a paid lifeguard at the club all season but on top of that he coached the "B" group kids at Junior Surf and was always available to help me out. For a young man he is very dedicated to the club and puts in a huge amount of effort and work. He is a natural leader and I believe in time he will take on a leadership position in the club.

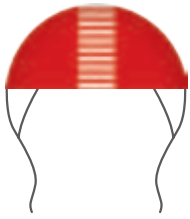

Despite these good numbers of patrolling members, with the club again maintaining patrols at Red Beach all season and Pakiri over the summer peak, there were a few times when resources were stretched and as usual one or two people did more than their fair share. Thanks to Chris Gurr for the many hours he put into managing the lifesaving activities. Thank you to all of you for giving up your Sunday mornings to train our Junior Surf members and thank you to all the parents and helpers that cooked the BBQ and cleaned up the clubhouse afterwards very much appreciated. One day hopefully they will all become active lifeguard members if the club.

Jandal Day in December went well with everyone out collecting and we received \$2,428 as our share of the collection worked out on how many collectors we had and how many hours we spent collecting. It is on again this year and NZ Surf is trying to make it the biggest fundraiser we do throughout the year.

On 11 December the Northern Region Junior Inter-Club Surf Carnival was held at Red Beach we had a large number of C group participants who attended along with their coaches and parents, thanks for your support without that the Junior Guards wouldn't be able to compete.

The 2012 season was highlighted by the Club winning the Northern Rescue of the Year Award for the mass rescue on April 2nd. A great club effort by the members involved.

We worked a total of 2,800 volunteer hours over the summer and recorded a marked increase in our preventative actions. Our patrols were audited on five occasions and we achieved 100% mark for each audit. For the second year in a row we have been the leader in "Best Practise" for our lifeguard achievements.

Trust Waikato announced a three year renewal of the Club sponsorship program which provides the club with operational funding which is impossible to replace from other sources. The Club is indeed grateful to the Trustees of Trust Waikato for their funding and for the annual special grants which have been instrumental in the successful development of our Junior Guard Program.

The club is actively supportive of the SLSNR board in its determination to maintain financial independence and in light of recent developments will continue this stance.

Beach erosion is causing us great concern as up to 12 meters of our sand hills has eroded and steep cliff faces are a major safety problem. The club will continue to work with the Waikato District Council to ensure the beach is safe for this summer.

As beach attendance continues to grow at a rapid rate we are faced with financial cut backs by the WDC to our Summer Regional Guard program. We are faced with the



very real issue that there could be drowning's this summer as the funding means that we have a 25% reduction in the program during the school holiday period. Comparing summer with summer on last year's statistics we carried out 12 rescues in this period. Without guards during this period in 2013 our concerns are very real.

The club continues to grow in numbers as our lifeguards further develop their skills to provide a safe swimming environment for all who swim at Sunset Beach

Whangarei Heads

I am very happy to report that the Whangarei Heads lifeguards have had yet again another successful season. We didn't have any major incidents on the beach, and had a great crew of volunteers keeping the club running. We had 15 rescues this season, 1 up from last year, and our volunteers worked a total of 2693 hours. Our number of preventatives was at its lowest level over the last 5 years, however this could be down to the increased public awareness of swimming between the flags requiring fewer interventions by lifeguards.

We achieved an average of 99.44% for our patrol audits, and completed the season with 29 refreshed lifeguards, and 9 refreshed IRB drivers. We sent two guards to the Youth Leadership Development Camp and 3 to Intermediate Lifeguard School. We only qualified 2 new lifeguards over the course of the season, which is something for us to work on next year.

Of biggest concern is our declining membership numbers. We have a total of 68 active members listed on the database, down on 1 from last year, but which is a serious reduction to previous seasons. Conversely, the number of members in the open and masters categories has been on the rise, which shows that our retention of older members is improving.

I need to pass on my thanks to the entire club committee, who kept the club running for yet another season. They have continued to work hard behind the scenes to ensure our lifeguards can operate effectively. In particular I would like to thank Chris Palmer, who has put untold hours into the work on our new building plans, and Julian Pitman who has filled in the gaps created by the departure of our Club Captain, Chief Instructor and PowerCraft Officer mid-season.

I would like to thank all our lifeguards, who yet again give up numerous hours over summer to help keep members of the public safe at Ocean Beach. Your commitment and dedication to the cause is impressive, and awe inspiring. Lastly I would like to thank Breanna Flavell-Johnson from SLSNR for the support she has provided, and wish her well for her new life in Australia.

I hope to see you all on the beach again this coming season.
