Please find below a guide on radio reporting and language.

Radio Checks:

NB: *Do not use the five-out-of-five descriptor as it is outdated and is not specific.*

The following should be referenced when conducting radio checks.

Pro Word	Meaning
Report on Signal Strength	
Loud	Your signal is very strong
Good	Your signal strength is good
Weak	Your signal strength is weak
Very Weak	Your signal strength is very weak
Broken	Your signal is broken and cannot be relied upon
Report on Readability	
Clear	Your message is very clear
Readable	Your message is readable
Unreadable	Your message is unreadable
Distorted	Your message is distorted
With Interference	Your message has interference

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Start of Patrol Reports:

Example: "SurfCom, SurfCom, this is Muriwai. Our Start of Patrol Report reads as follows from number of patrol members..."

1. List numbers from number of patrol members to number of ATVs.
"9, 1, 1, 4, 2."
2. List numbers from weather to wind direction.
"3, 2, 2, 2, 3."
3. Read out opening headcounts and conclude message with "over".
"Our 11 o'clock headcounts are 120 on beach, 60 in water for a total of 180, over."

2 & 4pm Headcounts:

Example: "SurfCom, SurfCom, this is Muriwai. Our 2 o'clock headcounts are 250 on beach, 50 in water for a total of 300, over."

1. Read out on-beach, in-water & total headcounts and conclude message with "over".

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End of Patrol Reports:

Example: "SurfCom, SurfCom, this is Muriwai. Our End of Patrol Report reads as follows from number of rescues..."

- List numbers from number of rescues to estimated number of public involved in preventative actions.
"1, 3, 0, 1, 0, 0, 10, 20."
- List peak headcounts & total hours worked.
"45, 220."
- Confirm closing time.
"We will be closing at 4 o'clock..."
- Read out closing headcounts and conclude message with over:
"Our 4 o'clock headcounts are 150 on beach, 50 in water for a total of 200, over."

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Additional Pro-words:

Pro-word	Meaning
Acknowledge/did you copy	<i>Let me know that you have received and understood my message</i>
Affirmative/Negative	<i>Yes/Correct - No/Incorrect</i>
Break	<i>I have finished a conversation with one station and am calling another without breaking my transmission.</i>
Correction	<i>An error has been made; the correct version is...</i>
How do you read	<i>How well are you receiving me?</i>
I Spell	<i>Transmitted before spelling a difficult word using the phonetic alphabet</i>
Negative	<i>No/Incorrect</i>
Nothing Heard	<i>No readable or no reply transmission heard</i>
Out	<i>The conversation is finished and I don't expect a reply. Used at the end of transmission as an indication to other stations that the network is clear and free for use</i>
Over	<i>I have finished my message and expect a reply</i>
Rescue, Rescue, Rescue	<i>Emergency broadcast prefix utilised to clear the radio channel and gain all stations attention</i>
Roger	<i>I have received and understood all of your last transmission</i>
Say Again	<i>I missed part or all of your last transmission. Transmit it again</i>
Stand by	<i>Please wait until I call you back. I need to complete my current job or get more information or assistance for you. Other stations may transmit</i>
Standing by	<i>Listening out and awaiting further information</i>

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
