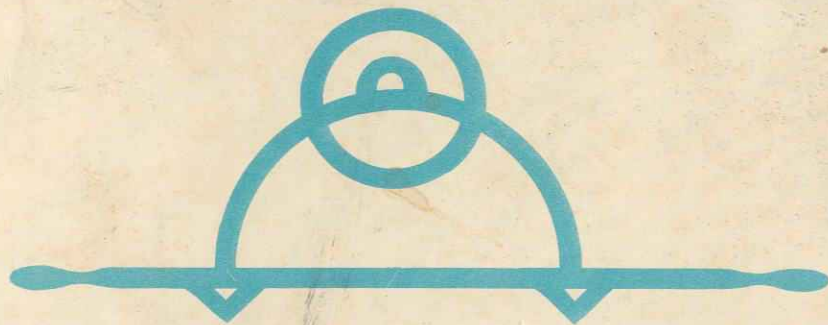

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Thirtieth Annual report of the Auckland Surf Life Saving Association it is our endeavour to highlight the principal aspects of every phase of our activities over the preceding twelve months and it is with pleasure that we record that another progressive year has been added to our History.

First and foremost was the "Royal Carnival" conducted at Mt Maunganui in the presence of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and Prince Phillip on Saturday the 9th of February, it was very pleasing to note that so many of our Clubs were able to attend.

The progress is evident with the formation of a new Club at Raglan called "Ngaranui" and the opening of three new Club houses namely, Karekare, Port Waikato and Ruakaka interest in other areas and increase in membership.

The accompanying paragraphs outline these facts and statistical data, financial statements and balance sheet incorporated herein, are self explanatory. An earnest study of this data is commended. Not only will it show that the first and principal object of the movement has been achieved to its fullest extent but all others have been promoted in an endeavour to give service to the bathing public of this area. Once again we can record that "NO LIVES WERE LOST WHILST PATROLS WERE ON DUTY" proving that the vigilance of our patrols has been faithfully maintained. As an illustration each Club affiliated to this Association spent 500 hours patrolling their beach, while overall our 445 active members maintained their self-appointed task and over 12,000 hours of actual patrol duty was recorded.

The records disclose that one person required resuscitation, and in addition 212 persons were treated with first aid.

Clubs are again reminded that it is essential that Rescue Report Forms be filled in, as well as first Aid Books as this is the only way an accurate record can be kept.

MERITORIOUS AWARDS

In recognition of the outstanding devotion to the humanitarian ideals of the Association in the Rescue of a person who was in danger of losing his life by drowning the N.Z.S.L.S.A. awarded to Peter Way of North Piha the Meritorious Award in Silver and to Don Wright of the Piha Club the Meritorious Award in ~~Silver~~ while the Two Clubs concerned were awarded Letters of Commendation.

BRONZE

The Presentation of these awards were made at a Mayoral reception on the 14th of June 1963 by His Worship the Mayor of Auckland Mr D.M. Robinson.

PETER WAY = MERITORIOUS AWARD IN SILVER.

On January 8, 1962, following the closing of the beach due to very heavy and danderous surf conditions, a man was sighted waving frantically at a distance of over five hundred yards from the beach, and immediately surf patrols were alerted, following which unseccessful attempts to reach the patient were made both by swimmers with line and belt, and with other life saving equipement.

Peter Way showed considerable knowledge of local conditions and ran some distance to the rocky north end of the beach, and although risking being crashed on to the rocks by the huge waves, which were estimated at twenty feet high, made use of the out-running current to carry him beyond the broken water to the patient, who was reached after a half-hour's swim, and who by this time had been carried to a position perilously close to the rocks, which made rescue almost impossible.

Peter Way supported the man and swam out to sea with him, and after a lapse of some time was relieved by Don Wright, a member of the Piha Surf Lifesaving Club, who had finally been successful in travelling through the surf on a ski, by which means the patient was brought to safety.

In view of the condition of the patient and the fact that the return trip through the surf was extremely hazardous, Peter Way refused to overload the ski and chose to remain beyond the broken line until a further member of the Piha Club was able to get his paddle board to sea and thus support Peter Way and allow him much-needed rest before attempting his return through the violent and broken seas.

In effecting this meritorious rescue Peter Way ran a tremendous risk of being dashed on to the rocks, which would have meant the inevitable loss of his life, and the part he played in the rescue far exceeded the duties which could be expected of him as a member of our movement, and his fearless and prompt action was responsible for the rescue which was carried out in the true traditions of our motto -
VIGILANCE - SERVICE - ENDURANCE.

DON WRIGHT - MERITORIOUS AWARD IN BRONZE

Don Wright of the Piha Lifesaving Club the Meritorious Award in Bronze for the part played by him in the successful rescue of a person in danger of drowning at North Piha Beach.

On January 8, 1962, following the closing of the beach due to dangerous surf conditions, a man was noticed being carried out and waving frantically for assistance, following which surf patrols were alerted, but many attempts to get a line out, or reach the patient by paddle board, were unsuccessful due to the extremely heavy and confused surf. In the meantime, Peter Way, of the North Piha Surf Lifesaving Club, had reached the patient after a swim through waves estimated at twenty feet high.

During this period of time Don Wright had made continuous attempts to negotiate the surf on a ski, only to be knocked off again and again. The dangerous conditions and his continued unseccessful efforts did not dismay him, but instilled even greater determination, and finally, by adopting the tactics of dismounting from the ski before each successive wave broke over him and remounting, he was successful in reaching the patient, who by this time had been dragged clear of the rocks to a position beyond the breaking waves by Peter Way.

Don Wright took over the patient, and was able to carry him back through the surf to safety.

It was apparent that due to the heavy surf conditions and the distance the patient and Peter Way were from from the water's edge, that without the determination of Don Wright in preserving to finally negotiate the seas both the patient and Peter Way would have had little chance of survival, and it is considered that his actions revealed a great devotion to duty.

We sincerely commend him for his services which were carried out in the true traditions of our motto.

LETTER OF COMMENDATION.

In recognition of the outstanding services rendered by members of North Piha Surf Lifesaving Club in the successful rescue carried out at North Piha on January 8, 1962 the Association had great pleasure in forwarding this Letter of Commendation.

We enjoy these visits very much and the opportunity to say a few words is much appreciated as it gives us the chance to express to all Club Members the Association point of view. Once again we have had a very full year on the beach as well as socially, our Surf Ball was once again an outstanding success thanks mainly to Abbie and Roy Day. The socials at Bob Williams appear to get better if that is possible and some of the after carnival functions were most enjoyable. Of the Carnival themselves, it would be just about the fullest year that the Association has had, firstly there were four Association carnivals, then the T.V. Direct broadcast which incidently made Surf History as the first ever in N.Z. then we have the Tamaki Lions Presentation at Mission Bay, Northern Regional Committee at Mt. Maunganui, N.Z. Championships at Napier, The Royal Carnival At Mt Maunganui and of course the Winter Carnival at Browns Bay as I said a very full year. Early in the season the Association had difficulty in obtaining accomodation for their meetings, owing to the fact that the Royal Life had to vacate their rooms which we shared, for a while we rented a room in Newton Rd at the cost of £2 per night which was far to expensive. Through the good officers of Mr Sheffield the Youth Activites Officer of the Internal Affairs Dept we were fortunate in arranging with the Auckland Junior Council to use their rooms for which we are most grateful. Meetings during the year have been very well attended, especially now that the Executive have two meetings, as well as the General Meeting to attend each month. The reason for this is that Executive and Officers constitute the Guilding Committee for the Nationals. May I congratulate all members of the Association, Club Delegates and Executives who assisted during the year and record my appreciation for their constructive comments and intrest as shown at Association Meetings, thus making my job as Chairman so much easier.

In closing, my congratulations to all award and trophy winners of last season, may you have as much success this year, but always remember our first duty is to the public on the beaches, and of our motto VIGILANCE & SERVICE

Examinations

97 candidates sat for the surf medallion Examination, of which 68 passed. The 30% failure is far too high for such a strong Association as Auckland. Five Instructors gained their certificates, and altogether this side of our activities can only be classed as "Satisfactory".

N.Z. Championships & Northern Regional Carnival.

All six Auckland members of the National Board were present and judged at Napier. The position for the future will be touched upon in a later paragraph. Fewer Auckland Judges were present at the N.R.C. Carnival at Mt Maunganui than usual, as the date fell during the holiday period and several were away from Auckland. Certain aspects of the Judging at this Carnival were unsatisfactory and Auckland Judges will have to make an effort to be present during the coming season to avoid this happening again.

Instructional Conference.

This was held at Browns Bay on 13/14 October and was well attended. These conferences serve a very useful purpose, and it is hoped that there will be an equally good attendance at the next one to be held at Browns Bay on 2nd. and 3rd. November.

National Board of Judges.

By an Auckland remit passed at the Annual Meeting of the N.Z.S.L.S.A. in July the National Board has been abolished. An Executive Committee consisting of the Chief Judges of each Association will control all matters of Judging at the National Championships.

Visit of Chief Life Guard, Los Angeles.

Towards the end of 1962 we were honoured by a short visit by Mr Bud Stevenson Chief Life Guard of the County of Los Angeles, U.S.A., and one of his Lieutenants, Don St. John, who were on their way to an International Surf Conference in Perth. Mr Stevenson was a mine of information on Life Saving in California and although their set up is entirely different, being based on professional Life Guards, those few who were able to meet these two fellow Life Savers were most impressed and a very valuable contact was made.

Combined Bronze and Surf Award.

The 1962 Annual Meeting of N.Z.S.L.S.A. authorised the N.Z. council to open negotiations with the Council of R.L.S.S. with a view to issuing a new award for Surf Club Members to enable them to pass the requirements of the Bronze and Surf Medallions in one examination, thus speeding up the process of making our new members into qualified life savers. This has been agreed to by both bodies, and the new conditions for the combined award have been laid down. The matter is hanging fire at the moment over the question of Examiners, but if this can be satisfactorily resolved, the new award may come into operation during the coming season. If it does, clubs will be notified immediately of the new conditions of the award and when they come into effect. Club members who already hold the R.L.S.S. Bronze Medallion will of course only have to sit the surf section of the test. The following is the proposed new test:-

First Section.

1. Expired Air Resuscitation using Mannikin or Mask
 2. Silvester - Brosch Resuscitation
- these two tests to be carried out as a drill procedure in accordance with the present R.L.S.S. Resuscitation Drill.
3. 440 yards Swim (in under nine minutes)
 4. Search and retrieve.
Perform surface dive in 6 - 7 feet of water and proceed with an underwater search over an area of approximately 10 feet by 20 feet, retrieve an object from the bottom, bring object to the surface and land at nearest point.
 5. Jump feet first from a height of 5 - 9 feet into water, making the shallowest entry possible.
 6. Tread water continuously for four minutes, using legs only for two and arms only for two minutes.
 7. Swim to a patient about ten yards away, surface dive, resurface and approach from the rear (having kept the subject in view under water) use the hip carry tow, tow for 50 yards and land patient on side of pool.

cont....

NOTE. Tests 5 6 and 7 are continous.

8. Make a shallow dive entry, release from any clutch or grip specified by the Examiner, tow patient at least 20 yards using any method other than in "7".

9. Oral questions on (a) Resuscitation (b) Surf rescue and Release drill.

Second Section.

10. Surf Rescue and resuscitation Drill as required at present except that no expired air resuscitation need be done other than correctly positioning Patient.

The tests for the two sections are to be held within a week of each other.

COMMUNITY CHEST REPORT

All affiliated clubs are realizing the importance of this fund raising medium and this support is apparent by the numbers of collectors, being supplied for re-allocating to the respective 20 Borough Councils collecting areas.

The total sum of money allocated to the association this year for services during the 1962 collection, and which is shown on the balance sheet of this report, shows a slight increase from that of 1961, which is a reaction that Borough Council Community Chest Trust Boards are sympathetic toward our movement. This position is encouraging, when it is realized that the overall collected amount was down last year, through the large number of seperate individual appeals, which were held around the date of the collection date of September 27, 1962.

Community Chest monies, which are passed to affilliated clubs are being wisely spent in the re-equipment necessary each year to ensure that our beach patrols are equipped with the necessary life saving equipement to effect a rescue, when required of them.

A special mention to those who helped in this Community Chest effort,as without them my work would have proved very difficult - I speak of the members who attended the many Borough Council Trust Board meetings - the check point members in each of the 20 areas and also Mrs. Small who carried out the hours typing work necessary in organizing the exercise.

A further appeal to Borough Council Allocation Committees will be necessary to bring to their notice the allocations made to our Association in relation to other worth while organisations. It would appear that details of the use of funds by recieipient clubs will need to be supplied to respective Borough Councils, as it is apparent that they are not fully aware of the cost involved to equip the patrols who give their services voluntary, to enable them to operate effectively for the safety of the swimming public in general.

All told a good deal of work in this field still remains to be carried out, before a full understanding of the humaniterian work that our Association fullfills, can be transmitted to the minds of the public in general, and Borough Councils who administer the allocation of chest monies to recieipient organizations.

However, at this moment the Business Houses and a section of the public are sympathetic towards our ideals and aims, and with an added effort and the assistance of every surf life saver, this goal can be achieved, which will react to the benefit of both the association and the general public.

On a closing note, may I thank all members who took part in the Community Chest collection this year, especially those who travelled many miles from their homes - their efforts were appreciated by the association and the Borough Council areas that they collected in. Many reports have reached me on the bearing and approach of our members to the householders, it is always well to remember that by your dress and polite approach, that the collector is judged, unknowingly and indirectly the association is measured. My sincere thanks on behalf of the association to you all for a job well done in the field of Community Chest.

As a prediction I would state that an important publicity consideration in the near future will be the adapting of Carnival presentation techniques to suit the ever growing power of television.

GEAR REPORT

1962-63 Season

"GEAR"

The supply of Life Saving equipment has been governed by the supply to Auckland from New Zealand Councils, Chief Gear Steward. Difficulty has been experienced in storing equipment which has been a problem for many years.

The Association is faced with storing our equipment in 3 separate buildings while awaiting delivery to individual clubs. Delivery of equipment to clubs this year has been better than ever before.

Club gear inspected this year was in most cases up to the standard required.

All clubs before using any reel for either patrol or competition work should check the safety pin of the Ross Belt, as a Surfers life could be lost if this is not in perfect working order.

cont.....

WAXED LINES

Before waxing a new line it should be soaked for at least 24 hours and then thoroughly stretched and dried ready for waxing. An old line should be soaked clean of sand and other particles and dried before waxing.

A simple method of waxing a line is to obtain a new four gallon kerosene tin, cut off the lid and smooth down the rough edges. Make a hole about 1in. in diameter on opposite sides for the line to pass through making sure the edges are smoothed down in the direction through which the line passes. Cut four lengths of dowel rods or broom handles to fit tightly inside the tin. Nailing from the outside place two rods about 2in. from the bottom of the tin and 2in from the sides. The other two placed opposite the 1in. holes so as the line passes over them without touching the sides of the tin. Make sure of tight fit to prevent the wax seeping through the nail holes.

The wax (Bees or Paraffin) should be boiled down so that it is as thin as possible then pour into tin. Attach a wire to the end of line and pass it through one hole, over top of first dowel under bottom dowells up over second dowel and through second hole before pouring wax into tin. A piece of clean cloth can be used to pass the line through to ensure no surplus wax is left on line. The line should then be suspended above ground for drying.

Some clubs in Ausrralia and New Zealand prefer to use a mixture of wax, parraffin and petrol. The petrol helps the wax and paraffin into the line more thoroughly. This is best done outside, due to fire risk. To wax two lines use- 6lb clear wax, 2lb paraffin wax and four pints petrol. Use a similar tin to the previous method. Place the tin inside a larger one filled with water and heat until the Wax has melted sufficiently to pull the line through.

REELS

It is important the reels receive the care and maintenance they deserve being the most costly and important piece of equipment. Moving parts well oiled, nuts checked and tightened periodically and chocks properly adjusted to drum flanges. If dipped in salt water to remove sand, it is essential to hose the reel down with fresh water afterwards, to check the developement of rust. Lines should be removed from the drums for drying especially if the full line has been used. This prevents damage to the reel drum battons through line shrinkage. Also a wet line left on a drum could develop mildew or otherwise damage the line on its inner ends.

There were a few complaints this year regarding the finished quality of the reels and we hope to have this rectified for the coming season.

R E P O R T B Y T R E A S U R E R

An extremely full and productive year is reflected in the accounts for the 1962/63 season. Public body and commercial recognition of the ideals of the movement is evident by the number of contributions made to both the Association and to the clubs direct. To the Clubs almost £1000 has been apportioned from Community Chest and by the efforts of Tamaki Lions on behalf of leading business firms and organised community groups a new complete reel was handed over to each Club at a ceremony held at Mission Bay early in the season. The Farmers Trading Christmas Parade netted to the Clubs over £200 divided according to the manpower each Club provided. The Auckland Savings Bank increased their grant to £500 and for this very fine contribution the Association is indeed grateful. Such cooperation naturally has prompted the Association to reciprocate wherever possible towards the Auckland Savings Bank.

Our appreciation is extended to the Auckland City Council, its Mayor Mr.D.M.Robinson and Assistant Town Clerk Mr.D.O.Sims for organising and most efficiently awarding the Meritorious Awards Certificates at a function held in the Council Chambers. Such a function as this would normally be beyond the means of our Association to provide.

Considerable amounts have been spent on purchase of gear, renewing various major items of stationery and for a short period a very great increase in the hiring of meeting rooms. The Association was required to shift on four occasions during the year, each under certain hardship and this did not ease the difficulty of administration. A definite need for permanent headquarters for the benefit of the Association and Clubs.

A grant to Clubs is available for expenses for educational work provided a request is forwarded setting out the location, date, mileage, costs, etc of such instruction. For the guidance of Clubs such expenditure as:-

1. Safety and Education of the Public whilst on the beaches.
2. Cost involved in arranging lectures - subject to Association approval, on artificail respiration etc.
3. Subsidised part of travelling cost by Instructors.
4. Cost of spare parts for Ambu Manikin.
5. Subsidised part of travelling cost of Demonstration Teams.
6. Subsidised part cost of typewriter and essential stationery.

Each Club is reminded of their obligation to forward yearly their Balance Sheet to the Association as no Community Chest payment can be made until this has been tabled.

CONCLUSION

I am certain that all members and supporters will after reading the foregoing report of the activities of the Association for the past year, be justly proud. May the coming season with its numerous problems be regarded as a challenge to us all, let us continue to work as a team for the benefit of all and Surf Life Saving in particular.
